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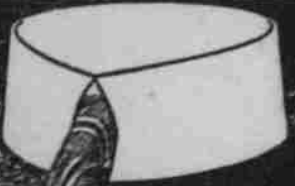

procure my passports, for protection while abroad.

"I called the consul-general by phone and told him my situation. He took my gold and wrote the company his check for the required number of 'tales.' That settled the matter of transport, and then I called for the passports. The consul-general was a Minnesotan, Goodnow by name, and a personal friend of Chancellor MacLean of the University of Nebraska. He sent greetings, to the chancellor, which I personally presented upon my return to Lincoln. These are the words of Consul-General Goodnow to me: 'You are a young man, Meier, of good habits. You will not need any passports. Americans should show to the world that they can travel without them.' So I did.

"Nebraskans are found almost everywhere you go, as are also other Americans. Before leaving Shanghai, a small, dark, intelligent looking man asked me what state I was from. I told him 'Nebraska.' 'Well,' said he, 'I am mighty glad to meet a Nebraska man. I just had some Nebraska ham for breakfast and now I have met a Nebraskan.' He said that he was an American too, but from the South. 'What state,' I asked. 'My country is,' said he, 'Equador.'

"Wherever I went I called on the American consuls, and I also made it a point to visit universities. One of the Almy boys had gone to study in Germany. I did not know at what university, nor did I know which one of the boys was there. When I reached Leipzig, I went direct to the university and inquired for a student by the name of Almy. After receiving a polite lecture on discipline, in which I was requested to remove my hat from my head on entering a public building, I

was given Billings Almy's address: 'Solomon Strasse, Numero 9, Partier Zwei.' That is where I found him. I spent several days with him, he standing all expenses. I, on return, paid his subscription to the college paper, 'The Nebraskan.'

"Through him I learned that John Almy, his brother, and Clarence Skinner, were then at Berlin. It was thus an easy matter to locate them, who in turn informed me that one of my classmates, Mrs. Kittle Shackleton Holmes, and her husband Ernest R. Holmes, were at that time in France attending the Paris University, and by obtaining their address, as I had Billings Almy's, I found them too, but with greater effort. They had moved. I mailed a post card, which was forwarded to them, and in return came a cordial invitation to dinner. She said, 'This is one way of meeting.' They also gave a great deal of time in directing me, and to Ernest Holmes I owe much as a guide in the old Latin quarters.

"Some time I may relate pleasing experiences at Oxford and Cambridge where in England another classmate, Charles William Wallace, a Nebraskan, won renown."
