### HISTORY ON SONGS GIVEN

Some of the Numbers Are "Brian the Brave," "The Girl I Left Behind Me," "The Last Rose of Summer," Etc.

An excellent program of Irish folk songs has been prepared by Mrs. Carrie B. Raymond, director of music.

The following is the history of the songs to be sung:

Saint Patrick's Day......Chorus Beethoven made a setting of this

popular melody, which was used as a war-song by the Irish mercenaries at the battle of Fontenoy in 1745, where the Irish brigade turned the fortunes of the day in favor of the French for whom they fought.

Brian the Brave......Men's Chorus Brian Boroimhe, the "Great Monach" of Ireland, was killed in the battle of Clontarf, after having defeated the Danes in twenty-five engagements. Several students have made inquiries as to what has become of the Employment Bureau, which was formerly located in the Temple. Not only has the location been changed, but the general system is also undergoing reconstruction. During this process things are bound to slide. This slump, however, will soon be counteracted by a marked increase in positions. In order to insure a high degree of efficiency in filling positions, the students of the University must co-operate with the Employment Bureau. In seeking employment, the men in charge should be kept in touch with. Then sooner or later the position will be offered. The bureau is free, both to the employer and to the applicant, because all expenses are paid by the University.
