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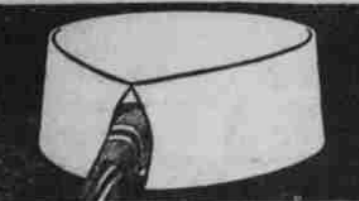

## WOMEN ATHLETES TRUST RULES TO HONOR SYSTEM

The honor system is used to enforce athletic training rules laid down for girl basketball players by the Women's Athletic association at the University of Wisconsin. If by chance any one of the eighty women, who are at present on the basketball squad, breaks a training rule, the honor system requires her to report that fact. Even examination week or big social events like the junior promenade do not excuse the breaking of rules.

Women in training are limited to one dance a week. They are required to have eight consecutive hours of sleep every night, and may eat nothing between meals except fruit, plain ice cream, white and graham crackers, or milk. Pie-crust, hot breast, tea, coffee and candy are prohibited.

## INSURANCE LOAN FUND GIFT OF SENIOR MEN

An insurance policy, the proceeds of which will be used as a loan fund for needy students, will form the memorial of the men of the senior class at the University of Wisconsin this year. The policy will be taken out in the name of the class president, and each senior will be asked to contribute \$1 annually for twenty years toward the policy. The senior women are planning to furnish a co-operative cottage for women as the memorial.

At Kansas this year, the women, as well as the men, will be asked to pay for the junior party. Several sororities have already promised their share.

## Chicago Uni. 25 Years Old

The celebration of the quarter-centennial of the University of Chicago, it is now definitely announced, will take place from Friday, June 2, to Tuesday, June 6. The original dates decided upon were June 9-13, but on account of the meeting in Chicago of the republican and progressive national conventions on June 7 the university's celebration of its twenty-fifth anniversary has been put forward one week.
