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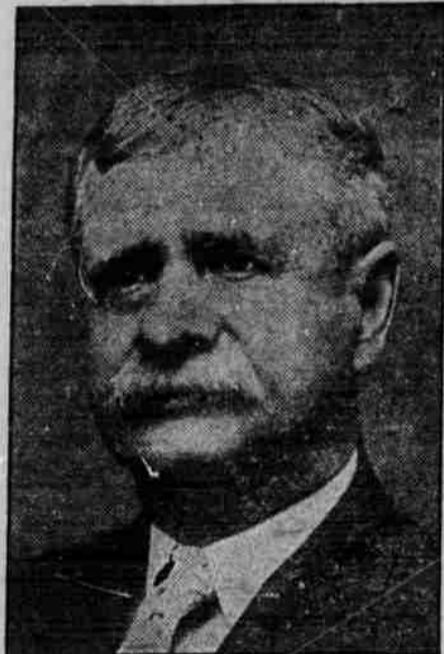

Lincoln, in Chicago, shortly after Mr. Lincoln's retirement as minister to Great Britain.
