membership shall be published in The Daily Nebraskan each publication day of the week preceding the date of the election.

Sec. 6. At a meeting of the athletic board previous to the election three members of the faculty shall be appointed an election board who shall conduct the election.

Sec. 7. Ballots. In addition to the names, there shall also be printed on the ballot the instruction: "Vote fore five (5)." All ballots which do not show a vote for exactly five (5) of the recognized candidates shall be void. Name of the eligible candidates shall appear on the ballot in alphabetical order.


The rules of the Australian ballot shall prevail.

Sec. 8. The five candidates having the highest number of votes shall be

elected. Sec. 9. Protests, with reasons and evidence for same, must be filed in writing with the secretary within two days after election. The ballots shall be retained by the secretary of the board until after the time for protest has expired.

Sec. 10. In case of a vacancy in the student membership, the athletic board shall elect a new member to fill said vacancy.
