


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**THE ESSENTIALS IN THE

these stages that the teaching can not  
be made vital which does not respect  
and supply these needs. At the be-  
ginning of adolescence the individual  
finds it necessary to work over all  
his social inheritance, adjusting it to  
the new viewpoint of life. The teacher  
must be alive to the needs of this  
period.

"This is the field that one must  
travel in mind who would determine  
what is essential in the training of a  
teacher. This is only the academic  
side, but unless one has innate ability  
and has been taught in the way sug-  
gested he can never become a true  
teacher, however perfect his profes-  
sional instruction. No one can teach  
what he does not know. Neither can  
any amount of professional instruction  
supply the need of academic training.

"The first requisite in the training of  
a teacher is good health and lofty  
ambition; the second, to come through  
training, is scholarship with right  
motives; and the third is professional  
skill in imparting knowledge and in-  
spiring others to right living."

tended the Lincoln Normal, where he  
prepared for public school work.

Upon leaving the normal he was  
successively superintendent of schools  
at Grafton, Sidney, and Alliance. For  
five years he was instructor in the  
State Junior Normal Schools, and for  
three years he was principal of the  
Junior Normal at Alliance.

For a number of years Mr. Pate has  
done a great deal of institute work  
during the summer months for various  
county superintendents, and his ser-  
vices as a lecturer and commencement  
speaker have been in demand in numer-  
ous places.

In western Nebraska he has served  
as president of the North Platte Val-  
ley Teachers' Association, and he has  
also been a member of the Executive  
Committee of the State Teachers' As-  
sociation. He is also a member of the  
Graduate Fraternity and of the School-  
masters' Club.

Mr. Pate is taking advanced work in  
education and will complete his work  
for a degree this summer.

The school system of Alliance is  
flourishing under the able administra-  
tion of Superintendent Pate. New  
courses of study have been established  
and new departments added. The  
schools include strong courses in  
manual training and domestic science,  
a thorough course in agriculture, and  
a commercial department which gives  
a two-year business course. In addi-  
tion to these courses are those which  
are older and well established in the  
school curriculum.
