## DR. LINK WRITES FOR BOTANICAL GAZETTE

Ag College Professor Contributes Paper on Potato Wilt and Dry Rot

The September issue of the Botanical Gazette, published by the University of Chicago press, contains a paper "A Physiological Study of Two Strains of Fusarium spp in their Casual Relation to Potato Wilt and Dry Rot" by Dr. George K. K. Link, associate professor of agricultural botany. The paper is published as a joint contribution from the Hull Botanical laboratory and the Nebraska experiment station. The research reported on was carried out at the experiment station and in the Chicago laboratories. This is the first paper to appear in this journal, which is the leading American botanical publication, as a joint publication from the Chicago laboratory and an experiment station.

### At Chicago

While at Chicago Dr. Link read papers before the Botanical club and the Biological club. He was chosen by the botany department to read the annual exchange paper of the Botanical club before the Zoology club, Dr. Child, professor of zoology, reading a paper on "Senescence and Rejuvenescence" before the Botanical club.


During the summer quarter upon invitation of the botany department, Dr. Link gave a series of five lectures on "The Economic Significance of Plant Diseases."
