been corrected by the co-operation of such a health supervision department and the physical training department, and the result has been a stronger and healthier student body. It has emphasized the value of prevention over that of cure. Many diseases have been discovered in their incipiency, and thus it was possible to make cures more easily. It has led to a greater saving of time and money to the students of the institution.

We, therefore, respectfully petition your honorable body to establish such a department at the University of Nebraska with a resident physician and nurse, who are to look after the health of the students and treat all cases that may come to their notice. We further petition that to facilitate such work an infirmary be established where proper treatment and care can be given.

RURAL SCHOOL PATRONS SUG-

Hope School Near Humboidt Subject of Special Attention at Agriculture Meeting

Two bills looking toward the betterment of the rural schools of Nebraska will be presented to the legislature as a result of the meeting of the Rural School Patrons' association at the state farm yesterday morning.

One of the proposed measures will provide for state co-operation with the extension department to establish a short course or winter term for boys and girls not in regular schools. The other request to be made of the legislature by the association is that the state printer let contracts for textbooks and sell them to rural school districts at 5 per cent above cost.
