"Jimmie" Gardner, '18, of Omaha, football and basketball star on Corn-husker teams for the last two years, left during examination week for Ithaca, N. Y., to register in the college of agriculture of Cornell university.

Gardner came to Nebraska after a brilliant high school career at Omaha, and continued his stellar work in the University. He was one of the most consistent football men of several seasons, but his strong fort was basketball, at which he was a guard of all-valley caliber. Both the football and basketball squads will suffer from losing him.

Gardner's decision to finish his college course at Cornell was a natural one. His home is in the east and he intends to go into farming in Maryland, making a course in agriculture adapted to eastern conditions especially desirable. He does not intend to participate in intercollegiate athletics at Cornell.
