 Lieutenant, battalion quartermasters. Each battery would be in charge of one captain, two first and two second lieutenants.
 Normal peace and war strength of a regiment of field artillery is: officers, peace 40, war 40; six batteries, peace 756 (126 men each), war 1,140 (190 each); headquarters company (band), peace 76, war 94; supply company, peace 28, war 32. Total, peace strength 860, war, 1,266.
 Prof. J. N. Bridgman of the college of engineering, Prof. Philo M. Buck, department of rhetoric, and Clarence J. Frankfurter, department of chemistry, are active in the work of tentative organization.
