A. O. Johnson, efficiency agent, was appointed officer to receive and account for supplies from the federal government for the Reserve Officers' Training Corps.

Degrees were voted to students who have completed the course of study in accordance with the recommendation of the several faculties. The lists have already been published in all the papers.

EXHIBITION AT THE
ART GALLERY NOW**

An exhibition of original illustrations, the work of Frank Walter Taylor, who is one of the foremost illustrators in the United States, is now in the art gallery. This exhibition includes some of the original illustrations done for the "Iron Woman," which appeared several years ago in Haper's, a number of construction scenes about New York City and some sketches made in Europe.

The work is done in charcoal and is a good example of the various effects which may be obtained from the same medium. The illustrations that he has made for "The Iron Woman" show a sympathetic insight into the aim and purpose of the author. They are in the opinion of critics what illustrations should be—a real help to the author in presenting the interpretation of the characters.

An exhibition of original illustrations is an unusual opportunity for the

students at Nebraska. Members of the department say that such a one has not been brought here for years, if ever before.

The October, 1916, issue of the Midwest Quarterly, just received from the publishers, contains several articles which address themselves largely to the undergraduate student public. The number was delayed by the absence of Prof. P. H. Frye, who, up to the time of his departure, was at the head of the editorial staff.

Charles Sumner Allen, known to almost everyone connected with the University of Nebraska, and a member of the advisory board of The Quarterly, contributes an article of general interest on "The Over-social Functions of the University." L. B. Pillsbury, '96, who is today one of the best known American psychologists, has an article entitled, "Some Aspects of Abnormal Psychology."

The other articles are "The Philosophy of Tragedy," by Prof. H. B. Alexander of the department of philosophy; "Made in Germany," by Randolph S. Paul, New York city; "The Chinese Colonies," by Minnie T. England, assistant professor of economics, and "A Pragmatic Interpretation of the History of Philosophy," by Prof. Horace M. Kalen of the University of Wisconsin.
