KATE HELZER HEAD OF HOME EC. CLUB

Prof. Maude Wilson of the home economics extension department, told the club of the proposed canning school which is to begin Wednesday, May 23. An evening class will be held from 7:30 to 9 that evening and three classes, at 10:30, 2:30 and 7:30 will be held Thursday and Friday. Saturday two classes, morning and afternoon, will be held.
Vegetable Canning Stressed

There is no conflict between religion and science, but there is a conflict between scientific truth and religious dogma. Dogmas are symbols which express religious truth in more or less appropriate allegories. They are not truth itself. A belief in the letter of dogmas indicates indolence and the lack of genuine religion. The old dogmatism must be surrendered and will have to give place to a higher and more religious conception, which, from methods employed may be called "The Religion of Science."

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
