Grinnell—An officers' reserve camp will be established at Grinnell college next year if arrangements now pending with the federal government can be completed. An attempt will be made to secure the services of a regular army officer, but if this is found impossible the camp will be put in charge of a reserve or retired officer. Further development of these plans will depend on the action taken by congress on the universal service bill. If the bill is amended so that men will receive credit for military work done in college it is almost certain that Grinnell will have a reserve camp next fall.—Ex.
