## HIGH SCHOOL FRATERNITY

### TROUBLE IS AT AN END

#### Students Accede to Board's Demands and Agree Not to Maintain Secret Societies

The long unsettled question of high school fraternities in Lincoln schools was brought to an end yesterday by an agreement on the part of the students to three articles adopted by the school board to bring about the abolition of the secret societies.

These agreements take the place of the action on the part of the board to compel the fraternity members to surrender their charters and pins. The articles will be presented to the members in duplicate, they to sign both, the board to hold one and the other to be given to the student that he may know just what he has signed.

#### Form of Agreement

Following are the three provisions of the agreement to be signed by the fraternity members:

"(1) During all the time I may be a student in the Lincoln High school, including all holidays and vacations, and up to the time I shall have graduated or permanently severed my connection with the Lincoln High school, I shall on no occasion nor at any time or place within or without the state of Nebraska, wear or display any pin, ring, badge or other insignia of membership in any secret fraternity or other organization whose existence is contrary to Nebraska laws.

"(2) I pledge my word and personal honor that I do not have in my possession nor in my custody, nor in any custody subject to my control, any charter of any secret fraternity as defined by the laws of Nebraska. I agree not to take possession of such charter, or to act under it, or to make any attempt to regain possession of it or to act under it at any time or place during the period mentioned in paragraph one.

"(3) In the matter of organizing or joining when organized any non-secret club or organization of any kind composed wholly or in part of Lincoln High school students I agree to consult with my parents in reference thereto and to submit to the proper committee of the faculty of the Lincoln High school a statement clearly defining the objects of the club the basis of membership and all the facts as to the management and control of it."
