**CO-EDS URGED TO BUY SWIMMING TICKETS**

Regular Classes to Be Held Soon in Lincoln High School Gymnasium

All University girls who can swim and those who desire to learn are urged to buy a ticket and attend the swimming classes at the Lincoln high school. An expert instructor has been secured who will give lessons to beginners and teach advanced work in fancy strokes to those who are more proficient. Tickets may be had from Miss Baldwin at her office in the Armory any morning from 9:30 until 10.

Every girl who can swim or who learns to do so before the end of the semester will be eligible for the swimming meet which is to be held at the end of the term and which will include class teams and individual events. Girls who enter on class team will have a chance to win 100 points toward an "N" sweater. Class teams will compete for the best form in various strokes and for speed.

The meet is to be held under the auspices of the Women's Athletic association, and promises to be superior to last year's contest.
