Position of Those in Practice

he considers the big point in the prac-
tice. Professor Wilson has been an
instructor in law courses for twenty-

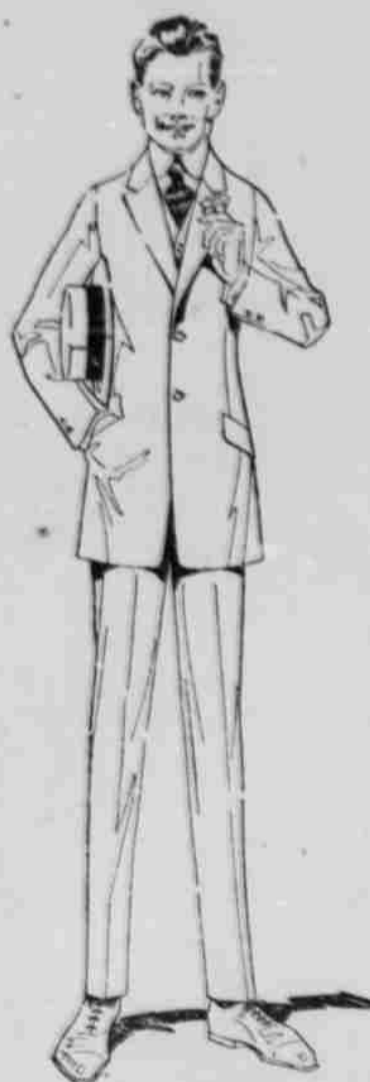
