**Vacate Nebraska Hall
to Soldier Students**

According to present plans the
pharmacy department is to move to
the Chemistry building which is be-
ing vacated. The department of geog-
raphy and conservation will move into
the new Chemistry building tempo-
rarily. These departments will be re-
turned to Nebraska hall when it is
vacated by the war department.

The Nebraska hall is now housing
the college of pharmacy, the depart-
ment of geography and conservation,
conservation and soil survey, state
conservation and welfare commission,
and the Red Cross work at the Uni-
versity, and is therefore one of the
busiest buildings on the campus and
is well adapted for the war purposes.
At present all rooms except those on
the very top are occupied.
