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CAPTAIN E. J. MACIVOR ISSUES ORDERS TO S. A. T. C. APPLICANTS

Publishes List of General Information For Benefit of Students

Main Physical Examinations Starting Today Continues Until All Are Examined

The commanding officer of the students' army training corps, University of Nebraska, requests that the following information be given out in order that the students of the University of Nebraska may become acquainted with all that is connected with the S. A. T. C. and how to proceed in order to obtain admission to the same.

Physical examination for students who are to be inducted into the S. A. T. C. University of Nebraska will begin Monday at 8 o'clock.

Only those students who registered Sept. 12th will be examined and inducted. All induction of registrants of June 5, 1917, June 5, 1918, August 24, 1918, classes will be handled after October 15, 1918. The latter will be instructed to report on days designated by the commanding officer for physical examination after which they will receive a notice from local board to report for induction.

These men are privileged to drill with the S. A. T. C. men, registrants of Sept. 12th from Oct. 1st to Oct. 15th, providing they supply themselves with the uniform prescribed by regulations for enlisted men. They may also request permission to be subsisted and quartered in with the rest of the S. A. T. C. men, but will have to pay the university for their subsistence and quarters. They will be charged the sums for subsistence and quarters as the government pays the University for the subsistence and quarters of the S. A. T. C. men, regis-

trants of Sept. 12th. Limited service men will be inducted into the S. A. T. C.

All students under 18 years of age who have registered in the University, thereby having proper qualifications, will be privileged to drill with the S. A. T. C. men and quartered and fed with them, but will have to buy their own uniforms. These uniforms will be the same as those worn by men inducted into the S. A. T. C., and they will pay the University for their subsistence and quarters. They will be subject to rules and regulations the same as students inducted into the S. A. T. C.

Students having registered with local boards prior to Sept. 12th, will be sure not to report for examination Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday, but will wait, as stated above, until after October 15th.

Failure to comply with this request may cause quite a bit of confusion.

Students will be informed under direction by University authorities when and where to report for physical examination. Students will not report for physical examination unless under authority from the University. This authority will be given in due time for each registrant of Sept. 12th. Those students who registered prior to Sept. 12th, will be informed by proper authorities to report for examination after Oct. 15th.

Regarding to S. N. T. C., no definite instruction has arrived at the military headquarters as yet. However, students are privileged to take it upon themselves to enter the S. A. T. C. or the S. N. T. C. at their own discretion.

As a caution students who registered Sept. 12th should get all the information they can relative to the authenticity of the S. N. T. C., as the time for their entering the S. A. T. C.

is limited to Oct. 15th. Information has been requested from the war department regarding the S. N. T. C. and this will be published as soon as received.

Any information pertaining to the S. A. T. C. that has not been given herein, will be given by reporting to the commandant of the University. His office is located in the military department of the Armory on the campus.

NAVY OPENS BRANCH FOR STUDENTS IN UNIVERSITY

Government Establishes Corps to Include 150 Men Who Will Train Here

Corresponds to S. A. T. C. Although Exact Status Not Yet Determined

Student-military topics were again stirred Saturday with the announcement from Washington that there would be a Students' Navy Training Corps organized at the University this fall.

One hundred fifty men will be admitted to this corps as compared with almost 1500 expected to be enlisted in the S. A. T. C. What the status of the new division will be is yet uncertain as no further word has been received except for the authorization of the corps.

The local recruiting station for the navy will handle all applicants for the branch and will give examinations possibly at once or will arrange for the appearance of the applicants later.

Whether the men will be restricted in their courses to make them comply with military needs is not known although it is probable that the men in this service will be under much the same regulations as are the men in the S. A. T. C.

GREEK PLEDGES RUN HIGH IN SPIRITED RUSHING SEASON

145 Men Are Pledged by Fraternities After Hard Fought Battle

Kappa Sigma Heads List With 18 Men; Delta Upsilon and Delta Tau Delta Second

War clouds hovering over the campus last week did not prevent University of Nebraska fraternities from staging one of the hardest fought battles that has been witnessed on the campus for many years. The present semester has seen the return of hundreds of students who had planned or remaining out of school this year because of war conditions, but who have come back in order to join the Nebraska organization of the S. A. T. C. The increased size of the freshman class has greatly increased the competition between the fraternities, and consequently, the number of pledges this year exceeds by a large number, the total of new members pledged to Greek letter societies at this time last year.

Late reports secured at midnight Saturday evening, gave incomplete returns from most of the fraternities, showing that more than 150 University students had been pledged to the fourteen fraternities in the University. The largest number of pledges was secured by Kappa Sigma fraternity, who has a total of 18 new men. Delta Upsilon and Delta Tau Delta come second with 15 men each. The average number to each fraternity is about 11 men, which is larger than the average scored by the fraternities last year.

The girls who were unable to pledge on Saturday will no doubt be given another opportunity later on, after investigations have been made, and the names passed.

It is rumored that some of the very important little white envelopes which left the office of the Pan-Hellenic board at noon were either stolen or lost. At any rate there were some that never reached their destination, and the confusion which resulted caused a lot of uneasiness both at the sorority houses and at the homes of the girls who failed to receive their bids.

In spite of this ill luck, the list available on Saturday shows eighty girls pledged, Alpha Omicron Pi heads the list with a total of thirteen, and Delta Delta Delta follows with eleven. Others show incomplete lists of only five or six which will probably be increased later.

KLINE TURNS ATTENTION TO UPPER-CLASSMEN TO FILL HUSKER LINEUP

Nebraska Coach Much Concerned Over Scarcity of Varsity Material

Freshmen Respond Favorably to Early Call—Kansas and Iowa Strong

With no assurance from Missouri Valley officials or S. A. T. C. authorities regarding action on the freshman rule in football circles this year, Coach Kline has turned his attention to the upperclassmen who have shown their ability on the gridiron to indicate their loyalty to Nebraska's cause by donning the moleskin and going to battle with the four veterans and those who will step into the line from last year's freshman squad.

There is not enough material in uniform so far, is the opinion of the coach, to carry on a winning season this fall. "We must have the assistance of every upper-classman who can

play football," said Kline in an interview Saturday. Both Kansas and Iowa are stacking up as strong as ever with eleven veterans returning for the Hawkeye squad and almost that many for the Jayhawkers.

Those desiring admittance to the S. N. T. C. will gain all available information at the local recruiting office and may make application there. Applicants for this branch will register in the same manner as applicants for S. A. T. C. were required to do and will then await further orders from the central department.

Both our eastern and southern rivals appear confident of victory over the Huskers in their battles here but Coach Kline is exerting every effort to turn the tide of opinion in his favor.

Although Washington has assured the continuance of the football game in college circles, the Husker chieftain considers winning the game a most important element in the sport.

Freshmen entering this year are responding excellently to the calls issued early last week and if the freshman rule is suspended, Nebraska can be well relied upon to add many scalps to her enviable list of collections.

NEARLY TWENTY-FIVE HUNDRED START YEAR AT UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Total Numbers Exceed Those of Last Year by Almost Half Thousand

1387 Applicants for Student Army Training Among Those Enrolled—Navy Opens Branch

Exceeding last year's total registration by almost a half thousand students, the University of Nebraska opens today with 2379 enrolled, including 1387 applicants for the Students' Army Training Corps and 9 applicants for the Student Navy Training Corps. The Student Navy Training Corps was organized only recently and word was received Saturday by Executive Dean C. C. Engberg authorizing the enlistment here of 150 men for this branch of service. While no complete information has been received concerning this branch it is thought that it will be organized on the same basis as the S. A. T. C.

Registrants to date compare favorably with those of last year, there being 2379 already enrolled while only 1898 were registered at the same time a year ago.

All departments are ready for the opening classes Monday and although there will be much confusion resulting from S. A. T. C. examinations and late registrations, it is supposed that all classes will be thoroughly organized and well under way with their assignments, when the applicants for the S. A. T. C. are inducted into the service, October 1.

Officials seem well pleased with the manner in which the registration was handled last week and are confident that the students' army train-

ing corps will not interrupt the general course of instruction.

The closest co-operation exists between University authorities and government representatives here, which accounts for the maximum efficiency with which every war measure is being handled.

While there will be many late registrants the total number expected to enroll is placed at not over 2500.
