FIRST CALL FOR POLITICAL CANDIDATES SOUNDED TODAY

Aspirants to Class Offices May File at Office of Registrar

War Spirit Expected to Prevail Over Annual Class Election

King politics will presently assume his throne in the minds of University students, and though being under stringent difficulties because of the war activities at this time, he assures us that his brief reign this year is to be one that will lack none of the old time spirit and fire that has always characterized the annual scrap, from time immemorial. War pep and glinger will be reflected in the annual class election, just as it is reflected in all University affairs this year.

Filings for the several class offices will begin today, and will continue up to five o'clock on Monday evening, October 7. Students who intend to "get out" for some of the class offices should go to the office of the registrar and make application there for the desired position. The names of all the candidates will be investigated to see if certain University obligations have been fulfilled, and that the candidate is qualified for the office that he seeks. All the candidates who fulfill these requirements will have their names placed on the ballot on election day, and all there is left for them to do, is to go to work and secure the votes.

The election will be staged on Tuesday, October 8, which gives the candidates plenty of time to get their machines working, and to get the votes coming their way. So far, no evidence has come out, about the existence of any so-called political machines, but it is well to believe that some of the dark horses are at work planning to run away with some of the coveted plums, once the news is published that the campaign season is under way. Next week will no doubt see evidences of subtle forces at work which are to throw the balance of the student votes in the direction of some ambitious college boy.

LYMAN LEAVES TO CONSULT WASHINGTON AUTHORITIES

Dr. R. A. Lyman has been called to Washington to ascertain the status of the medical reserves and of chemistry students who have had enough chemistry to be called special or technical chemists. The doctor will confer, when in Washington, with the committee on education and special training in the army department.

Presidents to Be Chosen

At the election of October 8, the senior president is to be chosen, and the senior member of the publication board. The junior and freshman presidents are to be elected, and also the members of these classes for the positions on the publication board. Minor officers of the several classes are not chosen at this time, but are chosen at a later date, in meetings of the classes, which are called by the newly elected presidents. Much honor is connected with all the minor offices as well as with the office of president, and hot rivalry is usually seen in the election of these officers.

Girls Important Factor

Candidates may well afford to look to the girls vote this year. While the vote of the co-eds will not be the deciding factor that it was last year, it is certain that no one can question the foresight of the candidate who seeks the vote of the girls. Woman suffrage is in vogue at Nebraska, and it is very probable that some of the fair co-eds will rival the boys in the chase for the political plums. Former years have always seen the presence of some coed's name on the election ballot, and no doubt the boys this year will have to strive against the large vote of some particularly popular young co-ed. When both the sexes are out for the offices the election takes on a more decided interest and every one of Nebraska's 3000 students watch the result of the election with great interest.

War Will Add Zest

The influence of the war will add to the zest of the election this year, and since this is the last time many of the students will have to hold an important office in class politics, it is expected that there will be a rush of candidates to the registrar's office to get their names on the ballot list. As the names are entered at the office of the registrar, they will be printed from time to time in the columns of The Daily Nebraskan, and comment will be made upon the progress of the election. It is hoped that all students will take a real live interest in the election and make it one of the best elections that has been held at the University for many years.

REGISTRATION EXPECTED TO REACH HIGH MARK

2688 Already Registered and More Are Seeking Admission

The total number of registrants for the University now stands at 2688, according to an announcement from Miss Florence McGahey, registrar, Thursday. Approximately 1600 of these have made application for induction into the S. A. T. C. or the S. N. T. C. The late registration has netted a total of 419 new registrants since Monday, of which 161 are from the College of Medicine at Omaha. Registration has been continuing at a lively pace all week and promises to pass the three thousand mark before its close.

W. S. G. A. TO GIVE PARTY WITH FRESHMAN GIRLS ON SATURDAY

Organization is Same As Former Nebraska Girls' Club

The first W. S. G. A. party will be held Saturday. At 2:30 o'clock a program will be given in the Temple. The rest of the afternoon will be given over to dancing and refreshments in the Art hall. All freshmen girls are especially urged to attend.

Last May during the Middle-Western conference of the Women's Self-Governing association at Minneapolis it was decided that all colleges in the western conference, such as the Nebraska Girls' club, should adopt the name W. S. G. A. This does not change the organization of the Girls' club in any way except in name.

The purpose of the W. S. G. A. is to offer an opportunity for friendly and helpful fellowship among the women of the school, to develop a feeling of mutual responsibility, and a high regard for both liberty and order, to be a medium in which the social standard of the unity and loyalty, and to bring before its members subjects of special interest and importance to college women. One of the chief aims at present is war work.

All women students, by registering in the University become associate members of the W. S. G. A. and upon payment of dues become active members. The annual dues are fifty cents one-half of which goes into a permanent fund for the care of sick women students and for assisting those who are making their way through school. The other half is used for current expenses of the association.

The innocents met Tuesday evening and Coach Kline appeared before them to discuss the need of men. With his help the society drafted a plan. Form letters will be mailed to every fraternity house on Wednesday morning, explaining the situation and asking for their co-operation in making football a go this fall.

Everybody on the campus must feel it his duty if he knows of any man who is eligible, to inform the coach or some member of the team, about him. The Iowa game is only a week from Saturday and "we must have men."

FOOTBALL TICKET CAMPAIGN IN WHIRLWIND START MONDAY

Goal Set at 2,000 in Big Drive Among Students and Soldiers

\$3.00 For Six Big Home Games—Profits All Go to the Red Cross

Students' football season tickets for the most stupendous schedule ever offered by the Cornhuskers will be placed on the market Monday morning by special solicitors all over the campus when the big whirlwind campaign will be inaugurated. The goal is set at 2,000 tickets sold and there will be no letup until that standard has been reached.

Three dollars, exchanged for the book of coupons entitles the purchaser to a reserved seat in the choicest section of the grandstand at every game on the Husker schedule. The central sections of the grandstand on the north side of the field are set aside for students and faculty, and they are given first chances at reserving them.

Profits Go to Red Cross

The entire proceeds of the football season after the expenses are cared for will be turned over to the American Red Cross. This arrangement was first made last year and the sum of \$7,000 was given to the cause. With such a big schedule billed this season there is no reason for this amount not being doubled.

The price of \$3.00 is ridiculously low when the admission for each game separately is figured up. Single admissions for the regular contests

are \$1.00 to \$2.00 and reserved seats are 50 cents extra. The big games, such as with Kansas and Notre Dame, the single admission is raised to \$1.50, \$2.00 and \$2.50. A season ticket for \$3.00 admits to all these games.

Captain E. J. MacIvor is a hearty supporter of football and he encourages the fans to support the team in every way possible. The coming schedule is made up almost entirely of contests with other S. A. T. C. aggregations and every battle is predicted to be a whizzer.

Coach Kline has not yet received an answer to his telegram notifying Director Jones at Iowa university that Nebraska is planning on using freshmen in the lineup against the Hawkeyes October 5. The representatives of the big ten conference schools have been called to Chicago to discuss the new ruling of the war department allowing freshmen to participate in games between S. A. T. C. teams, and Coach Kline believes that the Iowa director is at that conference and for that reason has not replied to his communication.

Practice Thursday afternoon consisted in chalk talk instruction by the coach and stiff workouts. Four men, Lyman, McCoy, Hoyt and Lanphere, were slightly banged up in the workouts but they will be in trim for the initial battle.

Several men who have shown promise in freshman football and basketball like Reynolds have not yet reported for practice and the coach would like to see them in the mole-skins. Former high school gridiron stars ought to be in the squad also in order to build up the Missouri valley championship team.
