THE FIRST RALLY

The long list of attractions for the first football rally of the season to be held at the Temple theatre this morning at 11 o'clock is sufficient to assure that every seat will be filled. Captain MacIvor has been secured to explain why football is being played at Nebraska this year; Assistant Coach Schissler will give out the "dope;" a member of the team will tell "how it will be done," and Prof. George E. Condra will be there to help create the sort of spirit that will bring victory. Four veterans cheer-leaders will drill the new students on the varsity yells and the fifty-piece University band will play U-U-Uni.

This convocation is the first and only opportunity students will have to practice their yells and every loyal Cornhusker who intends to help with the rooting on Saturday should be present to get in line. Those who will be unable to attend the game should be present to show the team that they will be with them in spirit.

With the battle with Iowa only two days distant the majority of Nebraska football fans are still without their season tickets. This fact may be attributed to either of two causes. They do not realize the excellence of the gridiron bill to be offered on the Lincoln field this year or they do not know where tickets may be obtained.

There is no excuse this year for any one who can possibly afford to buy a season ticket to do without. For three dollars one may see six games with the fastest teams in the country on the home grounds. This amounts to only fifty cents a game, or one-third the amount that would be paid for a single admission to the Iowa game alone. The season ticket includes reservations for games which on single admission tickets costs an extra fifty cents.

Students will have a section of the south stands to themselves this year and every seat should be filled with rooters for the opening game. Tickets should be obtained today at the Student Activities' office.

With the exception of the race for freshman class president, the political campaign will be a pitifully quiet affair unless the urgent need for exceptionally good candidates is realized immediately. Wednesday evening only one candidate had filed for the sophomore and senior presidencies and none had listed themselves for the race in the junior class. At least two candidates should file for each of these offices, and those who have prospect in mind should see that their names are entered before Friday at 5 o'clock.

There is often the belief that the first woman who files for an office is the one who will be elected and, as a result, other good candidates never post their names. This year especially, this belief is unfounded. The student body realizes the importance of

electing good men in every class for leaders and will vote with that realization in mind. Oftentimes the candidate who files first, is elected for no other reason than that other students are bluffed out. A good candidate should file even if ten have filed before him. If he is the man for the place his class will see that he is elected.

Windows in University hall were raised to the top Wednesday as a result of an effort on the part of suffocating students to obtain relief from the excess heat of the radiators. From early in the morning through the warmth of the afternoon the sizzle of the steam insistently made itself heard.

It may be impossible at the present time to eliminate this waste because of faulty piping, but it seems certain that if this is the case, an expenditure for alteration would be economy. If it is possible to run the heat for a few hours in the afternoon and then have it shut off, this should be done. To heat the rooms in the afternoon at the present time is both a waste to the state and a hindrance to efficient class-room work.

HOME ECONOMICS COURSE POINTS TO CONVERSATION

Co-eds Given Practical War Time Training in Laboratories at University Farm

With the opening of the school year at the State Farm, work in conservation began in earnest. Complying with the request of the federal department, college women are going to be taught to conserve in every place of household and home management.

The first semester of the school year a special course outlined by the federal food administration will be offered. This course will include the dietetic phase of foods as they must be prepared under new restrictions, and the economic phase of the food situation.

For this course a text book will be used which is being prepared by the administration. Supplements will be supplied from time to time to keep the book up to date. Every phase of food conservation will be included in this course, and food administration certificates will be issued to those successfully completing this course.

The practical side of all courses will be emphasized. A practice cottage will be a part of the course in home furnishing. This cottage will be one of thirty used in the United States this year.

Courses in household management, home furnishing and costume design-

ing will be offered at the opening of school. Later Miss Loomis plans to give courses in home making which will be open to all women, whether University students or not.

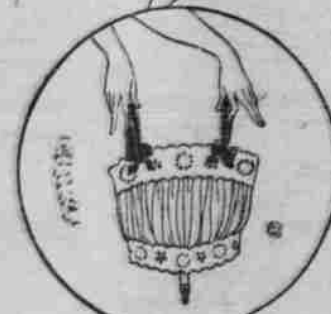
