CALL ONE HUNDRED SEVEN MEN FOR OFFICERS' TRAINING CAMP

Field Artillery Officers Will Visit Unit to Make Preliminary Examinations

Men Must Be Especially Fitted For the Branches to Which They Apply

The second call for officer material within the first three weeks of S. A. T. C. existence was received by Captain E. J. MacIvor, Wednesday morning, commanding the selection of sixty men for field artillery, thirty for pilots in the branch of military aeronautics, twelve observers and five maneuvering officers. Applications of men desiring to enter any of the designated branches of the army as candidates for officers' commissions will file with the authorities and undergo certain examinations by Captain MacIvor.

Artillery Officers Coming

Field artillery officers will visit the Nebraska detachment and examine the men whom the commandant recommends for officer training. Those who are finally selected will be sent direct to officers' training schools with the possibility of overseas service as commissioned officers when they complete their instruction.

Only men who are especially fitted for the branches named in the order, and who can meet the requirements of the several lines of service, as published in another part of this paper, need apply for the training. Other calls will be forthcoming for other branches of work and men are urged to wait until they can be placed in the line of work for which they are best fitted. It is the policy of the war department to use men in the kind of work they can do the best and be of the most service.

Following is the telegram received by Captain MacIvor Wednesday morning:

Commanding Officer, S. A. T. C.,
Univ. of Nebr., Lincoln, Nebr.:

Select immediately, not exceeding sixty field artillery officer candidates according to specifications of committee memorandum BD6 dated October 10, and mailed you the twelfth.

Field artillery officers will visit unit to examine men recommended. Permit no recruiting. Examinations by F. A. officers must be confined to men on your selected list. Prepare list (of) candidates (for) military aeronautics not exceeding thirty pilots, twelve observers, five maneuvering officers per specifications BD6. Report numbers listed all group (as) soon as ascertained.

Captain MacIvor Determined That Discipline Be Enforced

Conduct and actions of S. A. T. C. men have been decidedly displeasing to Captain MacIvor. Disrespect to officers and silly college pranks displayed by some students, have made him determined to enforce discipline and order rigidly.

Three men who were not giving the proper attention to the captain's announcement yesterday evening were called out of the grand stand before the entire battalion, and turned over to a lieutenant for punitive treatment. They had been laughing and joking instead of paying attention and Cap-

tain MacIvor singled them out and ordered them down on the field. One of them was found to be innocent of any misdemeanor, but the other two will be dealt with summarily.

An incident was cited by the captain Tuesday evening in which two S. A. T. C. men of section "A" showed discourtesy to a member of section "B," and were deserving of a sound thrashing at the hands of the latter.

When the men move into barracks, they must face strict discipline and the commandant is going to be on the look out for any violation of army regulations of etiquette.

SECTION B MEN FROM OUT STATE ARE HERE

The 420 men for section B of the S. A. T. C. are here, and are being taken care of as fast as possible. They represent every county of the state of Nebraska. The men arrived Tuesday and Wednesday.

A number of the men were given physical examination all Tuesday afternoon and evening. After the examination a number of the recruits were taken to the Hayward military academy in large army trucks.

The new men will do the same kind of work that has been done by the detachments preceding them. The work will include radio, motor mechanics and other technical lines. The men will be stationed at three different places—the state farm, Hayward military academy and the university proper. Those at the university will engage in radio.

All students who have been ill and who have not reported at Dean Engberg's office, should do so at once.

Captain MacIvor will select 16 men for field artillery, 30 pilots in military aeronautics, 12 observers, and five men for maneuvering officers. These sixty-three men must live up to specifications that will later be laid down for them.

MacIvor Details Forty-four Men For Husker Eleven—Absence Punishable

If Nebraska's Team Isn't a Pen- nant Winner it Won't Be Fault of the Commandant

For the first time in the history of the University of Nebraska all the prospective warriors of the gridiron are actually drafted into the game. Coach Kline and Captain MacIvor went over the list of S. A. T. C. men and picked a number who promised good material for Cornhusker football teams. These men will be required to attend the athletic practices as much as any soldier is compelled to obey military orders. In other words football is compulsory. It is army football.

As far as is known an order like the one just issued in connection with the football game has never been issued before in any school. Captain MacIvor believes that gridiron practice is just as beneficial as the regular army drill. The football men will have to do some drilling in the morning.

The principle involved in issuing the order may be applied to other activities of the university. The Nebraska must be published and if no volunteers are to be had in the newspaper line, some may be naturally drafted to do the work. In case the departments are not able to secure assistants the commandant may draft men for this work also.

S. A. T. C. DETACHMENT WILL MOVE INTO BARRACKS TODAY

Students to Get First Taste of Army Life and Its Hardships

Rigid Enforcement of Discipline to Be Carried Out—Daily Schedules Announced

Bedding, cots and quarters for S. A. T. C. men are ready, and as many as can be accommodated will move into barracks today, according to official information given out by Captain MacIvor, commandant of the post, Wednesday evening. The entire battalion will be divided into companies this morning at drill period, and the men will be assigned their quarters at that time.

S. A. T. C. students will begin their real army life as soon as they hit the barracks and will be given their first real taste of military discipline as is dealt to all United States soldiers. They will be held to strict regulations and as Captain MacIvor put it to the men yesterday evening before retreat, they will "have to show some speed." He intimated that they would have only three minutes in which to dress in the morning and men who have been in the habit of taking an hour or so for it will find themselves clear out of luck.

Discipline the Keynote

Discipline will be one of the keynotes of the training school and men will be held to definite prescribed schedules. The first call will sound at 6:15 every morning except Sunday and at 6:25 will be reveille. Most of the time will be taken up by various duties and school classes but the men will have Wednesday afternoon off for athletics and Saturday and Sunday afternoons for recreation.

According to present plans the war aims classes will be held from seven to nine in the evening, but this may be changed somewhat. Definite announcement concerning the war aims classes will be announced in time through The Daily Nebraskan or through bulletins. Every man is held strictly responsible for all announcements and the excuse that he did not see or hear of an order will not be accepted.

ISSUE SPECIFICATIONS FOR OFFICER MATERIAL

Capt. E. J. MacIvor Holds Every Man Responsible for List of Qualifications

No One Shall Apply for Any Branch Unless He Can Meet Requirements

Captain E. J. MacIvor, commandant of the students' army training corps at the University of Nebraska, read to division A Wednesday night a list of the drafts that were to be made upon this division for officer material in the various branches of service. The list includes a call for men for infantry, machine gun battalions, field artillery, coast artillery and military aeronautics. Military aeronautics includes pilots, airplane observers, balloon observers, and balloon maneuvering officers.

These are all that are called for for the first draft. Future drafts will in-

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
