University Mourns the Loss of Prominent Member of Junior Class

Paul J. Peterson of Neligh, Nebr., a prominent member of the junior class of the university, died of Spanish influenza at 2400 R street Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

He had been ill for five days and was believed to be recovering, when he suddenly became worse and passed away very unexpectedly.

The death of Paul Peterson comes as a great shock to all his friends in the university. He was a member of the Alpha Theta Chi fraternity and was recently initiated into Sigma Delta Chi, journalistic fraternity.

Peterson was very active in dramatic work at the university, and was a member of the Cornhusker staff last year. He was also a candidate for the presidency of the junior class this semester and was an acting sergeant in the S. A. T. C. battalion.

Paul Peterson had a wide circle of friends at the university and was held in high esteem by all the faculty and students. His ideals were the best and he was loved by all who knew him. His friends mourn the loss of a true comrade and a noble young man.

day, caused the city council to enlarge the scope of quarantine effecting public places and gatherings, and to delay for a longer period the lifting of the ban already in effect. In all probability another week may elapse before school is again in progress. Medical authorities of the S. A. T. C. diverted their attentions to inoculations of all men Saturday afternoon and later were busily engaged in taking care of those for whom the "shots" proved too strong. Sore arms and muscles were not uncommon, but nevertheless a number from each company answered the improvised sick call at 5 o'clock, and were taken to the infirmary. With the possibility of an increasing sick list, S. A. T. C. men regarded the delay in the opening of school with indifference.

O. T. C. APPLICANTS ARE CALLED BEFORE CAPTAIN MACIVOR

Many applicants for entrance into officers' training camps are today on the anxious seat waiting to hear the announcement of the names of the selected men. Applications for infantry, artillery and machine gun branches were closed Saturday noon. Of all those applying for these branches of the service, about eighty-five were called to report to Captain E. J. MacIvor for personal conference Saturday afternoon.

At these conferences questions were put to the men regarding their educational qualifications, business experience and other miscellaneous ques-



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tions about their individual applications. From these consultations the commandant is enabled to rate the men according to their ability and at the same time can observe their personal appearance and bearing. List Announced Tomorrow Monday night a list of the selected men will be given out for publication Tuesday. While the date has not yet been set for the departure of these future officers, it is likely that, as in the last call, they will be sent in less than a week's time. There will soon be a call given for applications for other branches included in the official order asking for 167 men. The branches still open include pilots, aeroplane observers, balloon observers and manuevering officers.
