farming. But these are only material things, conditions which apply only to certain designated territories. Conditions which confront the greater part of Europe must be considered first.

The boundary lines of all the nations have to be settled. In this various neutral nations will be involved. There is a grave possibility of dispute even between the allies, as to what the final outcome of this war shall be. Only certain general rules of agreement have been laid down. The cases of different nations have to be studied individually and treated separately. The work must be done so completely and faultlessly, that there will be no possible chance or excuse for any war after this.

The systems of government in most of the European countries will have to be altered. Some will have to be abolished and changed altogether. New educational systems will have to be introduced. The people must be edu-

cated and brought up with the right ideals and ideas in mind. The formation of democracy is a slow, continuous growth, and the environment must be such that the people will quickly realize the benefit to be derived from the change of government.

The people of the United States indeed have a stupendous task before them. We have entered the war, not for purposes of conquest, but as a disinterested nation, it is our duty to bring the world on the right plane of living, to make the world safe for democracy and democracy safe for the world.

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
