ALUMNI NOTES

Ferris W. Norris, '16, a former electrical engineer at the university, visited the engineering department last week. Mr. Norris is with the General Electric Company of Schenectady, New York, and will return there March 17th.

F. J. Leschinsky, '16, assistant instructor in the vocational work of the engineering department last summer, visited last week in Lincoln. Mr. Leschinsky was stationed at Camp Funston later in the summer, and was then placed on duty at Edgewood Arsenal in New Jersey. Captain Frankforter was formerly stationed at this arsenal when he was engaged in chemical warfare work.

Captain Walter Hall, a graduate of the electrical engineering department at the university in 1916, is visiting in the city. Captain Hall was granted a ten-day furlough from his troops, which landed at Norfolk, Virginia, several days ago, where they returned from France. He was in France over seventeen months, and only lacked three weeks of having his third service stripe. Captain Hall saw much service in coast artillery work, especially in range-finding and directing fire. At one time he had charge of a school of fire for American troops, on the Mediterranean coast. Captain Hall expects his discharge at an early date, when he may return to his former position with the Bryan-Marsh Electric Company of Chicago.

Lieutenant McKinley F. Clerk, '17, was visiting the engineering department last week before he went to accept a position with the Dempster Milling Company of Beatrice, Nebraska. Lieutenant Clerk was formerly connected with the International Harvester Company before his induction into the army. He received his university diploma at Fort Snelling in June, 1917. At first Lieutenant Clerk was in the aviation ground school at Austin, Texas, when he was transferred to Kelly Field, San Antonio. From here he went to a concentration camp at Dallas, Texas, and then entered an aerial gunners' school, Taffero, Fort Worth, Texas. After being transferred to Langley Field at Hampton, Virginia, Lieutenant Clerk was sent to Hoboken, New Jersey, and immediately to an aviation embarkation camp in Garden City, Long Island, where he was discharged December 8th.

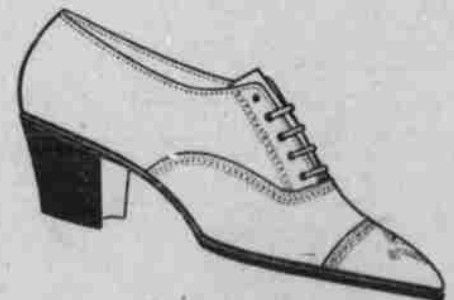
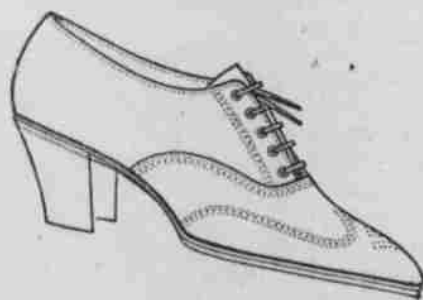
