ALUMI NOTES

Earl Reed, a young Nebraska artist, whose unusual talent was one of the discoveries of Professor Hayden when she was connected with the University of Nebraska and who for several years previous to the war had been engaged in designing in a Chicago studio, has recently published an engraving of a "Church Interior, Flirey, France," shown wrecked by shell fire. The engraving is dated January 1, 1919.

Miss Annis Chaiken, secretary of the University of Nebraska Alumni Association, received a letter from Jane L. Fox, '99, who is now vocational adviser at Long Beach Polytechnic High School, Dong Beach, Calif. W. D. Stephens is superintendent of the city schools at that place.

Professor O. J. Ferguson received a call Saturday from Lieut. Cyril J. Wertz, E. E., '17. He was a second lieutenant in the coast artillery and left Fort Monroe last September. Lieut. Wertz was in France over six

months and just returned this month on the Leviathan, formerly the Vaterland. He was mustered out at Camp Dodge, April 21st. Immediately he will begin work with the Public Service Company of York, Nebr. This company manufactures electric lighting fixtures and jobber of ice-making machines, and district steam heating apparatus.

Professor A. S. Riddervold is visiting on the campus for a few days. Professor Riddervold until last fall was assistant professor of civil engineering at the university.

Lieut. Carl A. Bessey, B. A., '97, E. E., '99, has written Dean O. V. P. Stout of the engineering department that he is now temporarily acting as a professor of electrical engineering in the A. E. F. College at Beaune, Cote D'Or, France. His postoffice address is A. P. O. 909. Lieut. Bessey will have charge of this work until June 15th. On this date he will return to join his regiment, the 113th engineers, "somewhere in Germany."

From May 12 to August 15, 1917, he attended the first officers' training camp and was commissioned a first lieutenant in the U. S. Regulars, with the 311th engineers. On November 1, 1917, he was transferred to Company B, 113th engineers. Lieut. Bessey was at Camp Shelby, Miss., until September 3, 1918, and arrived in France September 28th. He was at Chaumont until January 15, 1919, and was then asked to serve on a war damage inquiry board at the peace conference in Paris, where he remained until February 1, 1919. Until temporarily assigned to the teaching staff of the American university he was with the regulars at Saizeras, Meurthe and Moselle. This was with the 7th division. He does not know definitely when he will be able to return to this country.
