More Attractive Homes

The national movement for more attractive homes, more attractive towns, more sanitary and safe homes, has been on for several years and the impetus of the movement has increased with each year until now there is scarcely a town in the country that is not reached by the movement and hundreds of thousands of homes look forward to clean-up and paint-up week as a part of the regular spring work.

The national clean-up and paint-up campaign bureau has headquarters in St. Louis. It was founded in 1912 and the founder held the belief that the spring cleaning spirit that stirs most men and women and that had manifested itself in the form of scattered community clean-ups, ought to be organized for larger and permanent work each year. As a result of this, over one thousand towns and cities took hold of the clean-up and paint-up proposition the first year and last year, notwithstanding the hindrances and inability to accomplish much that war conditions imposed, over seven thousand cities and towns responded to the call for a paint-up campaign.

Not so much was done last year in the way of expenditures along this line as in the average years before. Government restrictions were prohibitive along many lines in the making of extensive improvements or paint-up campaigns. All these restrictions are now off and the opportunity for extensive work along this line is more pronounced because of the fact that so much was neglected in the last year.

We are returning to improved activities and while new building and construction is hesitating—but only temporarily—there ought to be no hesitancy whatever on the part of every business house and home in brightening up so that all of them will show an aspect of prosperity.

Painting and decorating can count wonderfully in the ordinary place of business. It can make for attractiveness in all lines of goods displayed. Clean surroundings and new paint on buildings on homes and farms adds wonderfully to the spirit of pride and satisfaction that people ought to have concerning their home surroundings.

Clean-up and paint-up campaigns ought not to be confined to one week this year. It ought to be a general movement to be taken hold of at the first opportunity and thousands and thousands of dollars can be added to the value of property through better appearances at a very nominal investment on the part of the owners. Money spent in this way, money spent in painting up and interior decorative work, is one of the best investments that people can make from a standpoint of added value to property and comfort and satisfaction of the owners.—Trade Review.
