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#### MORE CANDIDATES MUST FILE IF ELECTION IS TO BE HELD

Registrar Announces Dearth of FRESHMEN GIRLS Offices

No Selections for Publication Board-Filings Close at 5 Today

More candidates for class offices must file their applications before the close of filings at 5 o'clock this afternoon if an election is to be held next Tuesday, according to an announcement from the registrar's office Thursday afternoon.

But four candidates had filed at 5 o'clock Thursday. The lull in class politics at this time is especially noticeable in view of the large freshmen enrollment and the fact that at least six or seven applicants usually compete for the coveted honors of the first year class. The field is said to contain only two men for the office of freshman president.

Members of the student publication board will not be chosen at the coming election. A ruling made by the university senate last spring provides or the elect on of board members at the February election The members will begin their terms at the close of the second semester and will hold office for the following school year. Members who will serve on the board until the second semester election will be appointed by the clas presidents now holding office. This ruling closes the openings on the publication board and the election next Tuesday will be solely for the purpose of choosing presidents of the four classes.

The official list of the names of students who have so far filed for offices at the coming election is withheld until after filings are closed, but the names of a few of the candidates were received at the Daily Nebraskan office from outside sources. Clarence Swanson, '21, has indicated his desire to run for junior president and so far as is known is the only applicant for that office. Swanson was active in student activities team and belongs to the Vikings. junior society. He is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.
