MARIAN HARRIS HEADS ATTRACTIVE ORPHEUM PROGRAM THIS WEEK

Inside must—Marian Harris Heads

The latest jazz zifrom Broadway m-terminigled with a strain or two from grand opera featured the vaudeville program at the Orpheum Theatre this week. The Clinton Sisters opened the bill with several clever interpretative dances, dazzling and beautiful with varie-colored costumes. In a skit full of pep, Steve Juhasz proved to be a master of "Bunkology."

Marion Harris, famous vaudeville headliner and Victrola artist, brought down the house when she sang "Take Me To the Land of Jazz."

Mike Bernard, peer of ragtime pianists, and according to himself, "second only to Paderewski," played a riedley consisting of excerpts from "Mammy O'Mine" and "Hindustan." He also interpreted some old-time songs as featured by the foremost American comedians.

Madame Marguerita Sylva, on her first vaudeville tour, after successful seasons in grand opera, sang only one song from her favorite opera—"The Habanera" from "Carmen." She also featured "Madelon" and a new French novelty.

Skeet Gallagher and Irene Martin furnished much comedy, with o-ologues, songs and dances.

The bill closed with five classic dances by La Bernica, America's youngest prima ballerina, assisted by Yonne Verlaime, and a company of aesthetic dancers. Miss Helen Ruoss played a harp solo, and Miss Verlaime played "Zampa" on the violin, and at the same time performed a difficult toe dance. The beauty of the costumes was a distinct feature of this closing act.

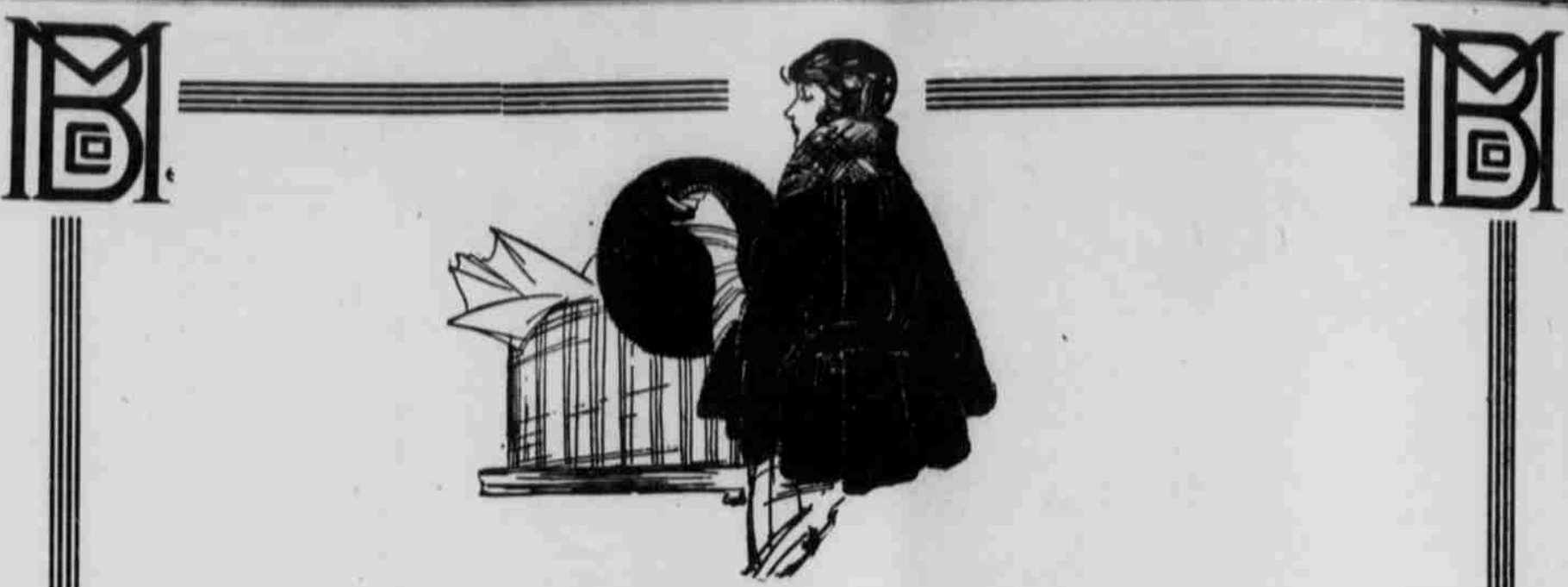
