ENGINEERS WILL HAVE CHAPTER IN NATIONAL SOCIETY

The American Association of Engineers, a new national engineering organization, is soon to have a student chapter in the university. A meeting of all engineers interested was held in the Blue Print office yesterday afternoon, Harry Hubbel presiding, Prof. Gehrig, who is a member of the Association and who was at one time chapter editor of the "Monad," the society's national publication, and Prof. Davis who is also an active member, outlined for the men the scope and work of the American Association of Engineers.

The object of the association is to raise the standard of ethics of the engineering profession and to promote the economic and social welfare of engineers; especially by affording means for the interchange of information beneficial to members of the engineering profession; maintaining a service clearing house for the benefit of the members supervising proposed legislation affecting the engineering profession and taking any action necessary or advisable to safeguard the profession's welfare; promulgating the association's ideas through proper publicity; and fostering a brotherly spirit among engineers.

After a considerable discussion, it was decided to organize and apply for a charter. Roy Scott was unanimously elected temporary president, and a campaign for new membership was outlined. A number of pamphlets have been ordered, describing in detail this organization, which will be distributed among the engineering students as soon as they arrive.
