

OF LINCOLN TEACHERS

Teachers in the Lincoln public schools will be granted a substantial increase of pay, if the voters express approval in the referendum to be taken on Saturday, January 37. A. salary increase of \$400 is proposed for each class room teacher that has taught in the Lincola schools since prior to the present school year, and teachers in the Lincoln high school will have their pay increased by \$300. These plans were unanimously approved of at a special meeting of the board of education upon the recommendation of Jesse Newlon, super-

intendent of the Lincoln schools, at a special meeting of the board, Wednesday night.

Other questions which the residents of Lincoln will be asked to approve of are: That teachers now on the elementary and high school schedules be placed on the same schedule and that the following tentative maximum be established on this schedule:


