Geo. E. Johnson, secretary of the Department of Public Works, spoke on "The Use of Trucks in Building and Mainaining Roads." "Motor Operation and Transport Service" was the subject of the address of Marcus Poteet. Mr. Poteet was graduated from the university in 1916. Loyd Winship, secetary and treasurer of the Hebb Motor Company, took up motor transporation in Nebraska and Thorne Brown state railway commissioner, spoke on 'Motor Transport Rates," Governor 3. R.
