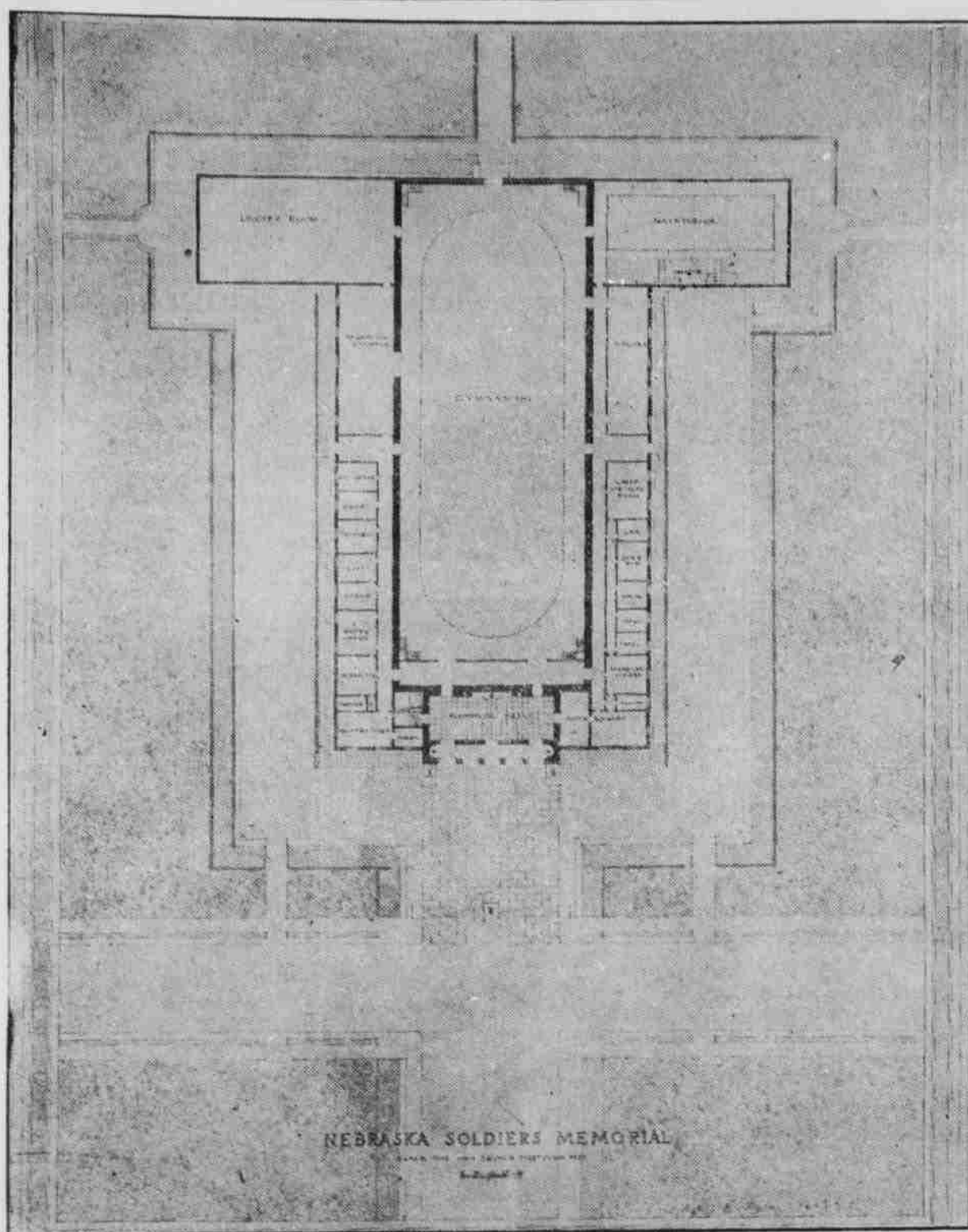
EXPERTS WORK ON STATION "A" SAFE

Four Specialists are Baffled by Freakish Locking of Post-office Safe Doors.

Four safe experts are at work on the postoffice safe at Station "A" Thursday evening when the business of the day was over, the postmaster closed the safe for the night and it has been closed ever since. When he attempted to open it Friday morning he was unable to do so. By some means a part of the mechanism had been jarred loose and had securely locked the outer door. Also the inner compartments were fastened burglar proof.

The experts have been at work since Friday in an attempt to unfasten the inner doors. Among the men now at work on the lock is Mr. Ward the Lincoln safe expert who opened the Greenwood bank safe after burglars had robbed the vault and jammed the lock a few weeks ago. Mr. Ward claims to have opened hundreds of safes and in the case of the Greenwood safe he unfastened a lock, which Omaha and Chicago experts gave up after three days work, in a few hours.

Mr. Ward's ability to open safes has been demonstrated time and again. He was the expert who opened the McCook safe not long ago when other experts were baffled by the combination.

CLAMP DOWN ON HIGH FRAT MEN

No Initiation for High School Men, Says Inter-Fraternity Council.

High school fraternity men are not eligible for initiation after September 1, 1920, according to the decision reached Sunday afternoon of the members of the Inter-Fraternity Council and about thirty fraternity alumni. This action was deemed necessary in view of the fact that a recent state law has taboed the actual operation of high school fraternities in Nebraska.

"It's a matter of self-preservation," says Prof. R. D. Scott, chairman of the Inter-Fraternity Council. He believes that the Greek letter societies in the University should take immediate steps in safeguarding their organizations from a possible dissolution by the state legislature.

Inquiries have reached the Council from various sources over the state regarding the attitude of the fraternities in connection with this matter. In the event that the University societies recognize high school fraternity men after next September 1, and held initiation thereafter, such a violation will mean that fraternities will forfeit initiation for a period of one year.

The fraternity situation at Nebraska is becoming acute and every precaution must be taken to avert such a possible reaction in the state legislature next fall.

The Memorial financial campaign is progressing favorably after its inauguration last Thursday. The committee has not given out definite figures on the amount raised to date, but the success so far indicates that the amount registers in the six figure zone.

The University quota has been placed at \$75,000 by the Nebraska Memorial Association. The campus campaign leaders are confident that this sum will be subscribed well before the last days of examination week. An added stimulus will be injected in the campaign this week and it is the hope that every student will be wearing the tag bearing the words "I have subscribed to the Memorial Campaign Fund."

Above is the architect's drawing of the gymnasium. It is estimated that this will cost \$750,000. A pamphlet issued by the Memorial Association describing the gymnasium says:

"The prime feature is Memorial Hall, on whose marble walls will be inscribed the names of great battles in which Nebraskans participated, always with distinction; and bronze tablets bearing the names of Gold Star men who fell in the struggle for liberty and the preservation of popular government. Other tablets will

SPLENDID MUSICALE TO BE HERE IN JUNE

Minneapolis Musicians Will Present Verdi's "Requiem Mass" June 4 and 5.

The Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra under the leadership of Emil Oberhoffer will present Verdi's "Requiem Mass" at the Lincoln Auditorium June 4 and 5. This will be in memory of the soldier dead from Nebraska. The orchestra is rated as one of the three largest and best trained musical combinations in the country. This orchestra is maintained by the people of Minneapolis by an annual guarantee of \$125,000 and gives a season of music over to the city of Minneapolis. The season is twenty-four weeks and from two to four concerts are given weekly.

The orchestra is composed of fifty pieces. The best musicians in the country are to be found in this group. The orchestra comes under the auspices of the University of Nebraska and it is highly recommended that students make it a point to attend all the concerts. It will be accompanied by the University chorus of 300 voices under the supervision of Mrs. Carrie B. Raymond. There will be a concert Friday, June 4, matinee Saturday, June 5, at 2:30 and another concert Saturday evening. Combination tickets will be sold at a lower rate than individual tickets. Tickets may be reserved at the Ross P. Curtice Music Company.

ALL-STARS TO MEET HUSKERS

Cook Claims that Ex-University Team Can Wallop Baseball Nine.

REYNOLDS WILL PITCH

The Husker baseball team have accepted "Pip" Cook's challenge and will play his aggregation of ex-league players Thursday afternoon at 4:30. Cook, who has gathered together twelve organized ball players, all of whom have either graduated from Nebraska or were at some time registered here, contends that he can trim the Husker nine providing that Pickett is not on the mound.

After winning the first game against South Dakota without the aid of Captain Pickett, Coach Schissler holds no fear for Cook's team. Reynolds will probably hurl for the Huskers and if the 16 to 0 victory of last Friday which he has to his credit is significant, he will flash a brand of pitching that will finish the "All Stars."

This picked team, which will clash with the Huskers at M street park Thursday afternoon, contains a couple of men who have played ball in the American League. The rest of the men in the All-Star aggregation have all played with some organized ball team. "Buck" Beltzer who captained the Huskers in their football year in '09 is included in the lineup. Sam Waugh, Jasper Clark and James Beltzer are also on the team.

The Nebraska team has won eight games out of their season's schedule of thirteen games. The break of luck experienced at Oklahoma was responsible for three of the five defeats. A split with Drake and one with South Dakota furnish the other two.

Thursday's game will be the Husker's last appearance on the diamond this year.

TWO TRACK EVENTS LEFT ON SCHEDULE

Nebraska will Compete at Ames and Michigan During Next Two Weeks.

But two more meets, the Missouri Valley meet at Ames this week and the Western Conference meet at Ann Arbor, Mich., on the following week, remain on the Nebraska track schedule for this year.

Daily workouts have put the Nebraska team in "pink of condition" and they will go to Ames Friday with the best of chances for taking the honors. The men who will make the trip will not be picked until Wednesday; but Coach Schulte plans on taking every man who shows promises of making points.

Nebraska's entrants at the Western Conference meet will be decided upon at the Ames meet. Only those men who place second or better in the Missouri Valley will be entered in the meet at Ann Arbor.

The remaining events in the numeral meet will be run off this afternoon on the athletic field and tryouts will be held for the Missouri Valley meet. All men who are not competing with the Varsity will in this way be given a chance to win numerals for this year's track. Two points are required before a man will receive numerals.
