HIGH SCHOOL FRATERNITIES.

The action of the Inter-Fraterity Council on the high school fraterity question is a most commendable one. The Council is in truth only following up its rulings passed in 1917 and concerning which some doubt has lately arisen that they might not actually be enforced. At that time, the rule stared that beginning with September, 1929, no high school traterality men would be pledged to University fraternities. This time limit was set in order to give the high school men four years to wind up their memberships. Some criticism had been heard that they were not properly impressed with the seriousness of it and consequently ignored the rule. But they were given a perfectly fair chance by the four years lee-way and had no reason to suppose that the rule would not be enforced.

These high school fraternities, by their actions and school spurit, have caused much trouble over the state and have aggravated the entire fraternity situation. It is generally felt that these organizations have not helped school spirit, have not tried to co-operate with the school authorities and have aided in creating a rather bolshevistic attitude among high school students. Moreover, the University men generally agree that members of such organizations do not develop into the best kind of material for their fraternities. From the great opposition shown to these fraternities all over the state, it is evident that something must be fundamentally wrong with their existence. The fact that in existing, they are violating a state law brings up the question as to whether the younger generation have the right attitude and knowledge and towards the obligations and demands of true citizenship. When high school students openly work against laws of the state, it is time to show them a new perspective of the loyalty which they owe to their state and nation,

There is at present even the possibility that such strenuous methods will be taken as to have passed the ruling that any University violating this Council rule will lose its charter at Nebraska. It is certainly to be hoped that every means will be taken to enforce the ruling next year and in the future, and that the whole fraternity situation will rapidly improve.

Beginning on the approaching Memorial day a small American flag will be kept on the grave of every American soldier in France.

Nebraska is not alone in her idea of a memorial for the soldler dead. At the University of California, \$1,500,000 was raised in San Francisco alone before any attempts were made to solicit from the rest of the state. Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Kansas and Washington are conducting similar campaigns with fine success. Nebraska must not fall below the mark. Husker spirit and co-operation are as great as anywhere in the country, but it has not yet been fully aroused. Only 600 students have thus far subscribed and although the average is high, it will not carry the drive over the top yet.

Think it over seriously. We all owe much to our Nebraska University and many are glad to make a sacrifice for the gymnasium. Three hundred committee-men will be out after subscriptions. But if one does not ask you for yours, take 't to the Student Activities office. Don't wait to be asked—beat them to it!

Socio-Economic Club


