The majority of them will come with all expenses paid as a result of their excellence as a member of some pig, corn, poultry, potato, calf, cooking, baking or sewing club. Funds for financing their trips were given by the stockyards companies of Omaha, Sioux City and St. Joseph, the Gooch Milling Company and the Hazel Atlas Glass Company.

The Junior farmers and home makers will spend the week receiving instruction in agriculture and home economics and in sight-seeing and educational trips about Lincoln and suburbs. One day, Friday, will be spent in Omaha. The week's program calls for classroom work every forenoon, with the afternoons devoted to the trips.
