GENERAL WOOD LEADS PARADE

Classes Dismissed at Noon-Colonel Paul Acts as Marshal of the Day.

R. O. T. C. and Band Will Have Entire Section-University Section Forms at 1:30.

General Leonard E. Wood, who is in Lincoln today, will lead the huge parade which is being staged to commemorate the second anniversary of the signing of the armistice. All classes will be dismissed at 12 o'clock, The parade, which is under the auspices of the American Legion, will include ex-service men of the World War, and veterans of the Civil War, Spanish-American conflict, and of foreign battles. Colonel Paul will act as marshal of the day.

The University R. O. T. C. regiment and the band will have an entire section reserved for them. Other University organizations, including the versity organizations, including the ex-marines, ex-soldiers and sailors and VARSITY BREAKS FROSH former members of the air service. will be represented. Two co-eds from each sorority will carry the University service flag.

The University section will form at 1:30 p. m. on R street east of Twelfth street. About four hundred ex-service men from the University have expressed willingness to march. They will not don their uniforms and will march with no distinction as to rank. The R. O. T. C. regiment will parade in uniform and will carry newly issued rifles.

Cadets May March with Companies. Any men in the regiment who have previously been connected with any branch of the service, will be excused from their companies in order to march with the ex-service men. Incapacitated veterans will ride in cars, according to plans announced by the committee from the American Legion.
