## HUSKERS TRYOUT ON COLISEUM FLOOR

Three Complete Teams in Readiness to Battle Invaders From Grinnell.

Coach Schissler took the Husker basketball squad to the Coliseum for their second workout on the new floor yesterday afternoon. The men are rapidly getting used to the new floor and are showing a great deal more speed than has been previously exhibited.

Every man on the Husker squad is being given a chance to show what he can do on a large floor, and Coach Schissler expects to use a large number of men in the games. Three full teams are working every night in preparation for the contests with the Grinnell quintet.

The floor at present is a great deal more slippery than the men have been used to playing upon and is hampering their speed somewhat, but the size offsets this disadvantage to a great extent.

Spectators will not be allowed on the floor, under any conditions during the games. The size of the armory made it necessary for a large number of the people to stand up at the ends of the court, but this has been done away at the Coliseum owing to the much larger seating capacity.

The exact time of the games has not been definitely announced, but they will not start until everybody has had plenty of time to get out to the Coliseum.

The Iowa team is scheduled to arrive some time Thursday night or Friday morning. Grinnell has a strong team this year and is coming to Lincoln with the intention of taking the Huskers scalp home with them. It will be remembered that the Iowans successfully defeated the Huskers two years ago and that Nebraska will have to win these two contests to even up this old score.

Director Luehring has made extensive plans for the opening Friday and Saturday and wants everybody on hand to make it a feature event in the history of the University.

## SCHOOL FOR CHRISTIAN LEADERS GIVES LECTURES

Important Subjects to Be Discussed by Religious Groups at Teachers' College Hall.

The Training School for Christian Leadership under the Department of Religious Education of the Lincoln Council of Churches began last night at 7:15 in the auditorium of Teachers' College Hall. Meetings will last until 9:30 p. m. The school extends to March 29, inclusive. Registration fee is one dollar, payable at the time of enrollment.

Some of the important subjects to be considered in the period are: Teen Age Specialization, Dramatization and Story Telling, Hand Work in Religious Education, Principles and Methods of Religious Education, Training and Devotional Life, Camp Fire and Canadian Program, Four-known as the first period, and a third fold Leadership Training Program for Boys, and Missionary Education. The first part of the evening will be a ty-minute "forum" will be conducted between this period and the second period which extends from 8:40 to 9:25 p. m.
