AUTO-TRACTOR COURSE

Twenty-two students finished their courses in the Auto-Tractor Course, in the Department of Agricultural Engineering February 5.

The course for these men consisted of four weeks of specialized work, in the following subjects: repair work, ignition, lubrication, bearings, valve timing, carburction, forge work, belt lacing all parts of chassis and operation of different tractors.
