TWENTY-TWO COMPLETE AUTO-TRACTOR COURSE

Twenty-two students finished their courses in the Auto-Tractor Course, in the Department of Agricultural Engineering February 5.

The course for these men consisted of four weeks of specialized work, in the following subjects: repair work, ignition, lubrication, bearings, valve timing, carburetion, forge work, belt lacing all parts of chassis and operation of different tractors.

These students were under the care of special instructors eight hours a day, with Saturday afternoon off. They had special laboratories and lecture rooms, thus not interfering with regular college classes. Each day was divided into two hours lecture, and six hours laboratory.
