Recent labor troubles over the employment of non-union janitors are said to have resulted in threats and several police had been on guard. The trouble was thought to hav been settled.

English Relations Strained.

LONDON, Feb. 8.-Anglo-American affairs are more strained than would appear on the surface. The questions under discussion can be settled easily through the usual diplomatic channels but these countries are dirfting apart largely because of lack of comprehendition of the others situvolved in war, but this is the way they are tending.

DUBLIN, Feb. 8 .- One hundred Sinn Feiners, masked and armed, entered the Great Northern Railway station and heldup the staff, dismantled the electric powerhouse and cut all telephone and telegraph wires.
