Literary Society Wins Prize in Song-Book Contest—Alpha Chi's and Alpha O's Next.

RACE NECK AND NECK

Campaign is Successful — Books Ordered and Will Be Here for Distribution Before Ivy Day.

The Unions won first, the Alpha Chi Omegas second, and the Alpha Omicron Pis, third, in the Cornhusker Songbook Subscription Drive. Undecided until the last minute, the winners were working neck and neck for the prizes. Only two subscriptions separated the Alpha Os from the Alpha Chi Os, when the final count was made.

The first prize is a large soft tufted tapestry rocking chair worth \$125. The Alpha Chi Omegas will receive a large piano lamp valued at \$75, and the winners of third place will get an electric table lamp worth \$40. The prizes have been on exhibition in the Benway Furniture company's window at Eleventh and O streets for the past ten days.

Although not as successful as anticipated, the campaign was a success. The books have been ordered and will be here before Ivy Day. The University will purchase a number of these books and copies will be on sale at the College Book Store.

Prize winning songs have not been announced yet. At the University Night performance Saturday night several of the songs were presented by the Alpha Phi Quartette and Izzie Pearsall and Lois Melton. The "University Girl," written by Freddy Richards and Allan Davis, proved very popular.

DEERING WINS DASH AT KANSAS CITY MEET

Husker Team Makes Very Creditable Showing at Indoor Meet Saturday.

Nebraska made a very creditable showing in the K. C. A. C. indoor track meet at Kansas City Saturday, considering the number of representatives entered for the different events.

Deering won first in the fifty-yard dash in the remarkable time of five and 3/5 seconds. The Nebraska runner won from a large field of some of the speediest runners in the Missouri Valley.

Wright had bad luck in both the hurdle events and was unable to place in the finals. John Gibbs, the Husker track captain, ran a wonderful race in the 500-yard dash, coming in second. Watson of the Kansas Aggie finished first in the remarkable time of 1:17 3/5. Watson was one of the members of the Olympic running team that represented the United States at Antwerp.

Moore and Gish competed in the high jump and both made good jumps before they were eliminated. Coach Schulte was very well pleased with the showing the Huskers made and feels that Nebraska should have one of the best track teams in the Missouri Valley conference. The Kansas City meet was more in the nature of a tryout than anything else.

Coach Schulte is working a large number of men every afternoon at the track and expects a larger number to turn out with the good weather that is now prevailing. The Husker athletes took their first work out on the cinders this afternoon. Coach Schulte is striving to make this a banner year for Nebraska in the track sport and wants every man who possibly can to turn out.

PLAY SECOND ROUND IN FRAT TOURNAMENT

Delta Tau, Sig Alphas and Silver Lynx All Win—Third Round Starts Tomorrow.

The second round of the interfraternity basketball tournament was completed yesterday when the Delta Tau Delta team defeated the Sig Alphas, the Silver Lynx winning from the Betas and the Delta Upsilon quiblet.

The Delta Tau Delta team won the count of 25 to 10. The Delta men pulled up a good lead during the first half but the Sig Alphas came back strong during the latter part of the game and put up a real battle.

In the second game the Sig Alphas had little trouble winning from the Betas. The final score was 35 to 5 in favor of the Sig Alpha crew. The Sig Alpha team displayed 100 per cent improvement over the exhibition on Friday night.

Final Game is Close.
The final contest was between the Delta Tau Delta and the Silver Lynx. This game was the most exciting of the second round contests and one extra five minute period was necessary to determine the winner. The Delta Tau Delta gained a lead on the Silver Lynx men but when time was called the count was 10 to 10. Bixby flipped a long one in for the Silver Lynx and Carson dropped a free throw through the basket. Another basket by one of the Silver Lynx men and the game was on ice for them. The final score was 13 to 11.

Tomorrow will be taken up with the third round games. The Phi Phi Chi team will meet the Delta Chi quintet in the first battle of the afternoon. This contest is scheduled for 3:45. The A. T. O. men will play the Asacias in the next contest and the Alpha Sigs will meet the Deltas. The Sig Alpha team will meet the Silver Lynx five tomorrow at 5 o'clock, winding up the third round.

IOWA AGS COMING TO CLOSE SEASON

Cornhuskers Will Play Final Games of Year this Week With Speedy Ames Quintet.

SQUAD IN FINE SHAPE

Missouri University Has Clear Claim to Valley Title—Has Sixteen Wins and No Defeats.

The Huskers will play their final games of the season on Friday and Saturday nights when Coach Schissler's proteges will mix with the Iowa State College quintet in a two game series.

The Nebraska team have already played two games with the Aggies, winning one and losing one. The Ames crew have a fast bunch and Coach Schissler is expecting some real competition in both cases.

The Husker squad is in first class condition after the two hard games with the Colgate team last week and Coach Schissler expects to finish the season with two more wins to the Husker's credit. Ames is the only team in the Missouri Valley Conference that has been able to defeat the Nebraska team.

The Missouri Valley championship has been awarded to Missouri. The Tigers have won sixteen games and have not lost one. Missouri will meet the Kansas Aggies in a two game series this week, winding up the season. Nebraska placed an easy second in the conference, having won seven Missouri Valley contests and losing only one.

Inter-Class Basketball.
The inter-class cage games will be played on Friday and Saturday, March 4 and 5. The first round will be played on Friday when the Fresh men and Juniors mix and the Seniors and the Sophomore battle.

The winners will meet the losers and the losers will play the winners in the finals. The finals will be played Saturday afternoon in connection with the finals of the inter-frat finals.

DEAN BURNETT RETURNS FROM LONG VISIT IN EAST

Visits Numerous Schools in That Section—In Search for Head of Nebraska Dairy Department.

Dean E. A. Burnett, of the Agricultural College has just returned from an extended visit in the east, where he has been endeavoring to get in touch with a dairyman to act as chairman of the dairy department at the University Farm. He visited the Michigan Agricultural College at Lansing, University of Illinois at Urbana, University of Vermont at Burlington, Maryland Agricultural College, Pennsylvania, State Agricultural College at Amherst, and Washington, D. C.

Dean Burnett states that, "All the institutions visited were interested in Nebraska's dairy department, but their interest waned when our salary schedule was presented. Nebraska's salary schedule which is now in force will not attract any experienced dairy men in the colleges visited. Of the institutions visited there were only two which had as well equipped dairy department as we have here in Nebraska."

The Dean further stated that "Nebraska's appropriation bill which was cut down by our legislators last week is more conservative than those requested in any of the colleges visited. All of these institutions expect to obtain money for new building programs, and they all pay salaries higher than Nebraska. The Pennsylvania State Agricultural College, with 3,000 students, has asked for a \$2,000,000 appropriation. The Michigan Agricultural College asked for \$3,000,000, and the University proper for \$12,000,000 making a total of \$15,000,000. The Illinois Agricultural College, with a registration of about the same as Nebraska, has asked for an appropriation of \$5,000,500."
