

STUDENT COUNCIL WANTS TO REMAIN

even more intangible than the others. The Student Council would, if it should function, supplant the traditional committees, organizations and societies, which have been a part—some for the past thirty years—of University tradition and life. Specifically, what 'Committees, organizations and societies' is the Student Council to supplant? How are they to supplant them? Moreover, the fact that any organization has existed for thirty years does not mean, ipso facto, that it is a democratic and efficient organization.

The fourth article of the petition contradicts the rest of the document. The first three articles say in effect—to abolish the Student Council because it threatens the government of the faculty and present school organizations (which organizations are not specified). The fourth article says, in effect—abolish the Student Council because it has not yet done any of these threatening things.

These four articles are the only reasons to abolish the Student Council, that have thus far been put forward. They are vague, general, self-contradictory statements, not founded

upon facts. Are we to abolish the Student Council, the only wholly representative organization in school, for a few high sounding misrepresentations? We, the members of the Student Council say, 'No!'

At the mass meeting of March 1, it was voted to hold an election so that the students might express their opinion on whether or not the Student Council should be abolished. At the meeting of the Student Council last Friday it was decided to hold the election Tuesday, March 15.

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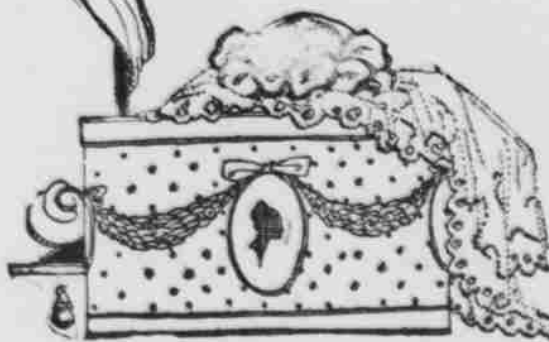


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
