Nix On the Goloshes
At Illinois Where
Profs Grow Mustaches

"I didn't see a single girl at the University of Illinois wearing four-buckle galoshes, but all the professors there are growing mustaches," was the comment of Dr. Harry Huntington, Methodist University pastor on the campus life of the students at the University of Illinois at Urbana.

Dr. Huntington was present at the dedication of the new Social Center building across the street from the campus of the University of Illinois in Urbana and also attended a national meeting of the Methodist University pastors. The Social Center is the first of a group of buildings which are being erected at the cost of about one million dollars for the students of the University by the Methodist people of the state. The buildings when complete will cover a block and will have accommodations for the recreation of about 2,000 students.

Dr. Huntington says that the Social Center building will be followed by a church, a school of religion, a library, and a residence for the pastor. A big open court in the center of the block will be beautified and used for social purposes. The building itself is complete in every detail, Mr. Huntington reports, and contains offices, social rooms, a Great Hall on the second floor, classrooms, reading rooms, and places for plays, entertainments, programs and social affairs of all sorts.

Social Center Building.
This building is the first thing of its kind at any of the American Universities and follows closely on the order of the ancient colleges in the English Universities. It is a long building, an dthe fact that it is situated just across the street from the main part of the campus insures its immediate and full use by the students. The group of buildings, of which the Social Center Hall is the first, is called the Wesley Foundation and is for the Methodist students. Another innovation in the building is a suite of rooms called the International suite. This group of rooms is made especially for the foreign students attending the University of Illinois.

Dr. Huntington told of the immense growth which the Urbana institution has had in the last few years. In 1880 there were 434 students enrolled in the college, while today there are more than twice that number of persons on the faculty alone. Ten thousand students attend the University of Illinois. The income of the University doubled between 1900 and 1905, doubled again between 1905 and 1910, and was doubled a third time in the next six years with the result that from 1900 to 1920 the number of buildings on the campus increased from 15 to 71.

This remarkable growth has made an ever-growing need for the kind of buildings such as the fine Social Center plant, and Dr. Huntington believes that they should be established wherever possible.



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
