allowance of two pounds. Two and
one-half pounds will be allowed for
the 135 and 145 pound classes and a
three pound allowance in the remain-
der of the divisions.

Winners of the various divisions
will be awarded their numerals for
their respective classes. The usual
rules governing the Western Intercol-
legiate Association will be used for
the tournament except for the length
of bouts. The preliminaries will be
decided in one bout of seven min-
utes. The finals will be run off in the
best two out of three five-minute
bouts.

There has been an unusually large
amount of interest displayed this sea-
son in the mat game and Dr. Clapp
is expecting a big turnout for the
tournament. Nebraska has completed
one of the most successful seasons
in the history of the school in the
mat game and Dr. Clapp is anxious

**WINFIELD SCOTT HALL
ADDRESSES STUDENTS**

Dr. Winfield Scott Hall, well known
lecturer, addressed University men at
a special men's convocation Thursday
morning at 11 o'clock on sex hygiene.
Dr. Hall was dean of the medical
school of Northwestern University.
During the war he toured the camps
giving lectures on hygiene to the sol-
diers. He has the reputation of hav-
ing given more lectures and covered

young men than any other man.

days and will give lectures before the
Lancaster Medical Association, the
Rotary Club, the Knife and Fork
Club and the Kiwanis Club. Dr. L.
