

## NEBRASKA AND IOWA TO CLASH IN FORENSICS

Two Institutions to Stage Debate Contests Last of This Month.

The annual Nebraska-Iowa debates will be held this year at Lincoln and at Iowa City the end of April. The debate at Iowa City will be April 28; that at Lincoln on either April 28 or April 29.

The live question of the open versus the closed shop will be discussed. The phrasing of the proposition will be: "Resolved, That the policy of the closed shop should receive the support of public opinion."

For the selection of Nebraska's teams a preliminary contest will be held, probably next Tuesday, according to bulletin board announcements in the Intercollegiate Debate Seminary, Room U 106 A, by Prof. M. M. Fogg. Some fifteen students have indicated their intention to compete for the honor of representing the University. Four members of each team will be appointed—three speakers and one alternate. Iowa selected her teams over a week ago.

The first round of arguments will this year be cut from the usual twelve minutes to eight or nine minutes and the time for the rebuttal arguments will be increased to six minutes. This will give more time for the give-and-take open forum discussion at the end of the regular debate, when the audience will put questions to the members of the teams.
