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**EIGHT TENNIS COURTS
 SOON READY FOR USE**

To Charge One Dollar Membership
 Fee for Entrance Into Club—
 Tickets on Sale.

A part of the University tennis courts will be ready this week. Director of Athletics Fred W. Luehring announced Monday afternoon that about eight of the courts would be ready and that the additional courts would be opened up for the use of the students as soon as they are put in readiness.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the University of Nebraska Tennis club Monday afternoon it was decided that a one dollar fee should be charged the students and faculty members for use of the courts during the remainder of the semester. The committee feels that by making a light fee more students will be encouraged to use the courts.

Faculty and Students Eligible.
 For the present the courts will be for the use of students and faculty members only. With the opening of the entire set of courts those in charge may decide to admit the citizens to membership under certain conditions.

To play on the courts a student must have paid the one dollar membership charge or paid the daily admission charge which will probably be 25 cents. The memberships will be non-transferable.

A man will be in charge of the courts at all times and the plan is to keep the courts in excellent condition.

The membership tickets in the tennis club will probably be on sale at the Student Publication office Wednesday morning. Additional information regarding the rules and regulations regarding play on the courts will be given in the Wednesday issue of the Daily Nebraskan.

**Laura B. Pfeiffer Talks
 TO PERU DINNER CLUB**

"The Present Attempt at World Organization" Was Subject of University Professor.

Dr. Laura B. Pfeiffer, associate professor of European history, spoke at the Faculty Dinner Club banquet, spoke on "The Present Attempt at World Organization." She also addressed the Peru students at chapel in the morning.

The banquet, which was the last of the year, was the most elaborate affair given by the club. Fifty members were present. The club is composed of all of the men and women members of the faculty. After the banquet and speech by Dr. Pfeiffer those present were divided into four groups and each group presented a skit based on a Shakespearean play. Local songs and yells composed for the occasion were enjoyed and there was also a takeoff on the commencement exercises.

Dr. Pfeiffer left Lincoln early Friday morning. She was met at Auburn by a car and drove from there the 12 miles to Peru in a driving rain. She told an audience of three hundred at the chapel of her experiences in Germany and France in 1920. Miss Pfeiffer was the guest of Professor Mattie Ellis of the history department at luncheon at the Faculty Women's Boarding Club.

**UNIQUE EXHIBIT IN
 ARMSTRONGS' WINDOW**

Early Monday, decorations in Armstrongs' display window aroused the interest of persons passing by.
