## TWO HUNDRED LAWS ATTEND BARBEQUE

Parade Features Morning—Boxing  
 Matches and Fancy Riding  
 in Afternoon.

Two hundred students, the entire  
 law college faculty, members of the  
 Lincoln city bar association and three  
 unbroken horses attended the annual  
 barbecue of the College of Law all  
 day Thursday, May 12, at the state  
 fair grounds. Classes in that college  
 were dismissed for the day.  
 The festivities began at 9 o'clock  
 in the morning with a parade of law  
 students lead by the law college band,  
 under the direction of Herman  
 Schroeder, law '21. The parade  
 stopped long enough in Social Science  
 hall to vote in a body. The principal  
 campus walks, O street and the  
 streets bordering the University were  
 included in the line of march. When  
 the merry-makers reached the court  
 in front of University hall, they  
 formed a circle surrounding the band  
 and sang the songs of the University  
 and the law college.

**Dean Engberg Impersonated.**  
 Cecil Strimple, '22, impersonated  
 Dean Engberg on his familiar bicycle,  
 but had little success in trying to  
 quell the parading students.

The students were taken to the  
 state fair grounds in trucks and street  
 cars. Indoor baseball, the old-time  
 game of "horse-shoe," and track  
 events occupied the time before the  
 roasting of the ox.

Roast ox and garnishments, ice  
 cream, pie and coffee were handed  
 out to the hungry barristers at the  
 noon hour.

The juniors of the law college  
 trounced the seniors in a game of  
 baseball, 7-5. A home run by Herman  
 Schroeder for the graduates featured  
 the game. Batteries for the seniors  
 were Glebe and Elliott, for the juniors,  
 M. Munn, Thomsen and Van Pelt,  
 Schoepfel.

A boxing match between four  
 "dusksies," and exhibitions of fancy  
 riding by Bern Coulter, '21, and James  
 Giffin, '21, were on the afternoon's  
 program. The members of the law  
 college attended the Haskell-Nebraska  
 baseball game in a body.

## A FEW GOOD SEATS LEFT FOR KOSMET KLUB PLAY

Students Asked to Make Reservations  
 at Once for "Most Prime  
 Minister."

A few good seats are left for the  
 musical production, "The Most Prime  
 Minister," which the University Kos-  
 met Klub is presenting at the Or-  
 pheum theater Tuesday evening, May  
 17. Students are urged to buy their  
 seats as soon as possible in order  
 that they may be sure of seeing this  
 comedy, which is the first offering of  
 the Klub in four years. Tickets are  
 selling for 50 cents, \$1 and \$1.50.

The cast is composed entirely of  
 University students and they also  
 comprise the choruses of the play.  
 The theme is entirely original and  
 was developed by members of the  
 Kosmet Klub. The musical scores  
 were composed by Wilbur Chenoweth.  
 Rehearsals have been under way  
 for almost six weeks. The players  
 have already cast aside their amateur  
 style and have assumed a professional  
 appearance.

"Students will be humming the  
 songs introduced for months after the  
 performance," said a member of the  
 committee in charge of the play yester-  
 day.

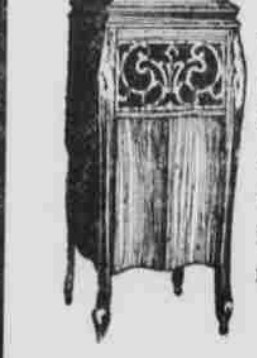
