All students this year, who had previous work at the University, received prior to registration, unofficial credit books, in which were entered the course they have already taken, the credit hours made, and the grades. This system was adopted so that each student could more easily ascertain what requirements he or she must meet, and what delinquencies, if any, must be removed, before a degree can be granted.
