

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT HAS SOME CHANGES

Freshman English To Be Three Hour Course Required Of All Students.

A radical change is reported in the English department this year. Freshman English is now to be a three hour course and is required of all students entering the university. English I and II, the beginning course in English, will now give three hours' credit and be required of all students entering the University with a minimum of six high school entrance points. English III and IV, a more advanced course, for freshmen entering with eight points of credit in high school English, will be given under the same conditions. It will also be a three hour course. Professors Frye and Scott are members of a committee to arrange this work.

A number of new appointments have been made in the faculty of the Arts and Science college. New instructors will take up the work of several departments. Among these are the departments of philosophy, mathematics, modern languages, English, fine arts, and political science.

Registration Place Changed.

Registration this year will proceed upon much the same lines as last year. The place of registration, however, will be in Social Science hall instead of the Armory as formerly. Freshmen will register in room 108. Upper classmen will enroll in various other parts of the building. The same system of time cards will be used this year as before in order to insure a more even distribution of students thru the registration period so that the machinery of the departments will not become congested.

Students who were in the university last year will have the same advisors that they had last year. New students will be assigned advisors who will arrange their programs and help them with their registration. The offices in which each advisor can be found will be published on the bulletin boards. About forty advisors have been assigned to this work. Twenty of these will care for the needs of new students and the remaining twenty will advise the returning students.

List of New Instructors.

New instructors in the college of Arts and Sciences are as follows: Mathematics department, Russell L. Grossnickle and Leo O. Gormley; Mr. Clear Golden; Philosophy, Charles Modern languages, Miss Shemel and Henry Patterson; Bacteriology, Mr. Lindgren; Fine Arts, Miss Melba Bradshaw and Herbert Yenne; English, Rowse B. Wilcox, Mr. Butterworth, and Miss Ruth Odell; Political Science, Mr. Boots. Several of these new instructors are graduates of the University of Nebraska.

PLENTY OF ROOMS FOR STUDENTS THIS YEAR

"Y" Conducts Active Campaign In Interest of Those Seeking Rooms.

Plenty of rooms are available for students this year. A canvass by the Y. M. C. A. of the city was made to find places for students to stay and the situation is declared to be encouraging.

The prices will not be much different than last year. Taxes have raised since that time, and the people having rooms feel that they cannot afford a reduction.


All possible help is given students to find a suitable room. A chart hangs in the hall of the Temple on which are listed the available rooms accord-

ing to location. There were originally about eleven hundred rooms, but they are rapidly being filled up. A few more calls are coming to the university Y. M. C. A. from people wishing to rent rooms.

The boarding situation is good, also. About half of the students are able to board where they room, and for

those who do not have this opportunity, the university cafeterias, and downtown eating houses offer ample facilities.
