Thursday Parties—

The United States department of Agriculture in cooperation with the University of Nebraska, G. E. Condra, director, has just completed the publication of a soil survey of Sheridan county. The survey was conducted by Louis A. Olfanger, of the United States department of agriculture and H. L. Bodell, L. Britton, S. G. H. Taylor, and F. M. Deutsch of the Nebraska soil survey. The report contains 60 pages and 2 large colored maps and includes a description of the area climate, agriculture and soils. Sheridan county, Nebraska lies in the northwestern part of the state joining South Dakota. It is 69 miles north and south, and 36 miles east and west, and has an area of 2,433 square miles.

Mr. Harold Moritz of Seattle, Wash., will take the place of Miss Harlett Wyman as instructor in mechanical drawing. Miss Wyman has gone into the missionary field. Mr. Moritz was a student at the University of Washington for three years, and then went to the Massachusetts institute of Technology for two years and graduated in mechanical engineering. Mr. Moritz comes to the university well recommended.
