AT THE THEATRES

Lyric—"The Affairs of Anatol" is easily the best picture in Lincoln this week. It has been advertised as an all-star cast and is distinctly enjoyable for its really good acting throughout. Wallace Reid carries the burden of the show splendidly and gives one of the best portrayals of "juvenile characters that he has ever been done. Gloria Swanson as his wife is charming. Theodore Roberts is splendid in his heavy role and proves that beyond a doubt he is an actor of fine ability. Every member of the cast deserves praise. The name of Cecille De Mille on a film as director means much and the reason is apparent throughout "The Affairs of Anatol." The settings are gorgeous and the outdoor locations beautiful.

WAR WITH GERMANY SERVED AS SPY IN

and a sister, the boy's only surviving kinsman, was burned to death, with her child when the Germans fired Kiev.

After the capture of Kemern, near Riga, Marek served as a spy within the German lines, obtaining information that won him the Russian medal and the honorary rank of officer. Later he fought against the Turks with the Cossack cavalry. After the Russian revolution, he joined the Czechoslovak army in its long trans-Siberian fight against the Bolsheviks, serving part of the time as a spy within the Bolshevik lines. At Moscow he manned the machine gun which defended a group of allied councillors, against an attack of the Bolshevik rabble. Upon his return to Czechoslovakia a year ago, he was recognized by President Masaryk, decorated by him, and given a refuge in the royal castle at Prague until a few months ago, when he came to America hoping to complete an engineering course eventually in one of our universities.

Young Marek touched the shores of the United States once before when he accompanied a transport from Vladivostok to San Francisco, but his present visit was by the way of the Atlantic. His troop ship was wrecked off the coast of Japan, where he spent six months of waiting, traveling through the country and studying the language. Subsequently he visited in China, India, Egypt and several European countries, completing a swing around the globe when he re-visited San Francisco two months ago.

Most of the young veteran's stay in this country has been spent among his countrymen, speaking a foreign tongue, hence he has had but little opportunity to learn even the rudiments of the English language, but in the course of a year he hopes to be on friendly terms with our strange idioms, although he says he will always have an enemy in our Bolshevik English spelling.

Young Marek is registered in the College of Arts and Sciences, but is carrying two courses in the engineering colleges, where he hopes eventually to qualify for the chemical and electrical branches. The effects of a bullet wound in his heel and the tortures inflicted by the Bolsheviks when they tried to wring a confession of his spy activities from him, which troubled him seriously for a year, have disappeared; hence he finds his work in physical training especially enjoyable, for it is the only course where his poor understanding of English does not prove a formidable handicap.

Prof. Orin Stephanek, who served in the war as a Y. M. C. A. secretary, in Prague, became interested in young Marek when the latter first visited in Lincoln last May, and it was largely through the professor's intervention

that Marek is attending Nebraska university. This youngest of war veterans does not show the effects of five years of service upon his body—he still appears the boy in his teens that he really is.
